Use of Red Cross and McNamara Defense Fund Stamps on Obverse Side of Envelope Forbidden.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 29.—An order which will discourage the use of Red Cross stamps and the McNamara defense fund stamps, because on their faces they are called "stamps," was issued today by Postmaster General Hitchcock after conferring with Third Assistant Brit.

Use of such stamps on the obverse side of letters was forbidden. Serious inconvenience in handling the mails from particular localities has been experienced by the postal authorities on account of the increasing use of adhesive stamps.

Use of the Red Cross stamps during the last Christmas holiday period, Postmaster General Hitchcock issued a general order that no adhesive stamps except United States postage stamps should be attached to the address side of a letter or package.

Thousands of letters bearing stamps on the obverse side of the envelopes have been received at the dead letter office since the order.

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JAPANESE WILL PAY RUSSIA

Car and Mikado Very Friendly as Result of Settlement.

Japan Agrees to Hand Over \$150,000 for Private Claims to Buy Property at Port Arthur and to Pay for Ship.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 29.—The emperor of Russia and the emperor of Japan exchanged telegrams today on the occasion of the settlement of questions relating to various claims and counter-claims for indemnity on both sides for losses incurred during the war.

Japan also agreed to pay \$50,000 for a Red Cross ship, which it seized and which now has become unfit for use.
