Japan will purchase for \$55,000 the property of Russians situated on concession land in the suburban districts of Fort Arthur. It agreed to pay rental for houses of Russians at wantung, and abandons claim to the Fort Arthur municipality as the municipal funds are needed to satisfy the claims of contractors

Japan also agreed to pay \$80,000 for a Red Cross ship, which it selzed and which now has become unfit for use. The former itussian hospital ship Angara, which is to be returned to Russia, has been sent to the dry dock at Kure for repairs before too transfer is made.

'the Rossia points out that the claims between Russia and Japan have been settled without recourse to arbitration and that Japan has reversed the decision of its own prize courts with regard to the Angara and the Red Cross ship Orel. 


