Oxford Man Kills Children and Self to Join Dead Wife

THOMASTON, Me., Aug. 29.-Grief over the death of his wife led Edward Bennett, an Englishman and a graduate of Oxford university, who has been a resident here for the past two years, to murder his three children and then take his own life today. To make his own death certain the man went to the water's edge, took a dose of cyanide of potassium and jumped in. His body was found when the tide receded tonight.

The children are Edward, aged 6; Barbara, aged 4, and Nancy, aged 2. Bennett's wife died three weeks ago, and since then the children had been cared for by a housekeeper, Mrs. Thurlow. After having killed the children, apparently during the night, Bennett wrote a minute description of how the deed was

done and also a long paper in defense of his position. The letter is addressed to the Rev. Russell Wood, rector of the Episcopal church at Rockland, where Bennett and his famlly attended, and is as follows:

"My darling children have gone to join their mother, as I am going to join them all and to face my God, who I hope will forgive me if I have done wrong. "Nancy and Eddie went with chloroforn alone, Nancy certainly with no pain and I hope Eddie with little. Barbara I had to give K. C. N. (cyanide of potassium) and I am afraid that she must have suffered, but it was short and I gave her

chloroform immediately, so I hope it was not bad. "I am going to take K. C. N. As I do not know how much to take I am going down to the sea that I may certainly drown if the K. C. N. is not sufficient. I am placing the safe against the door so that Mrs. Thurlow cannot get in and will have to get help, which will mitigate

the shock to her." Then follows a dissertion of murder and arguments by which Bennett seeks to de-

fend his act. The murder was not discovered until late. On a cot beside her father's bed was the body of the baby, Nancy. She appeared to be sleeping peacefully, but investigation showed that life had been extinet for hours. In an adjoining room were the bodies of the other two children, side by side on their bed. Eennett's bed had not been disturbed. On his deak were found the letter and a financial account which the man had prepared.
