He Would Restrain Knights of Pythias

George W. Covell Asks that Order Creating Fifth Class of Members Be Annulled.

The legislation of 1906, by which the supreme lodge of Knights of Pythizs established a new membership class in its endowment rank, received another airing in United States district court Wednesday morning when Judge W. H. Munger heard arguments on an application for a temporary injunction against the collection of insurance premiums which George W. Covell, the plaintiff, claims this legislation has rendered excessive.

The case started originally in the state courts by Covell on behalf of himself and others similarly affected against the supreme lodge of the order, is based on the allegation that the new legislation, by removing the new blood among the order's insured men to the fifth class, has worked a hardship on the older members, who are left in the fourth class.

The original petition asked that the order's legislation be declared null and void. Wednesday's hearing had to do only with the temporary injunction and objections to the defendant's answer. Judge Munger handed down no decree, taking the case under advisement for a time.
