SHEEP—Duliness was the main feature of sheep and lamb trade, a condition that is not very surprising when recent flood-tire runs are considered. The fresh surply amounted to fully 7,000 heal and found a comparatively open field as yesterday's clearance of all classes of stock was complete. The feeder purchase yestering was measured by over 2,000 head, 60 per cent of receipts. This total gives a four days purchase by country buyers, etc., of fully 77,000 head, a figure that will probably be increased to over 3,000 when today's buy is included. Total receipts for the five days are by far the largest of any week this season, amounting to over 125,000 head.

Very little business was transacted today until well along toward the dinner hour, but general feeling appeared steady and

opening sales indicated a quotably unchanged market. Choice fat lambs are still selling up as high as \$5.90 and a \$6.00 top is recognised in the list of quotations. Fairly good grades are none too active at \$5.50 and downward.

As compared with last week's close prices on fat lambs show heavy losses of fully souther while fat sheep and yearlings are closing steady to \$5c lower in apots. Feeder lambs show an average deciline of about \$0 cents and feeder sheep have held up wall, current prices ruling weak to hardly worse than lic off. Big bulk of receipts consisted of lambs mostly feeders. Volume of feeder business lately tells the story of cornbelt demand better than mere words. Speculators have helped considerably in making clearances, however, and the accumulation in this quarter at present is rather heavy.
