#### CLUB NEED NOT PAY IF MAN DIES BEFORE JOINING TEAM

National Base Ball Commission An nounces Wording of New Rule.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 8.—The national base ball commission has decided that Player Ernest Wille, claimed by the St. Louis Americans, should go to the Waco club of the Texas league, but the St. Louis club may get the player by the usual grafting process.

The commission announced for the first time the wording of the new rule relative to reimbursement of a club which purchases a player who dies before reporting. It follows:

"It is agreed that in the event of the death or permanent incapacity of a player, prior to his reporting to the party of the second part and giving it actual service in the training of a championship season, this agreement shall be null and void and the party of the first part binds itself to forthwith return to the party of the second part all or any of the consideration received for him, whether it be in money or the release of one or more players and to absolve said party of the second part from all obligations for payments that have not matured."
