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ANNEXATION IS NOW FAVORED

Petitions Are Being Prepared for Circulation in South Omaha.

SENTIMENT IS NOW CHANGED

Many Who Were Formerly Opposed to Uniting Omaha and South Omaha Now Favor the Plan and Will Push It.

After simmering for several days the annexation project for South Omaha broke its shell Tuesday morning and it is understood that petitions will be circulated at once or with a little delay as possible. The move is said to have taken a wide swath, including some of the big corporations of this locality. Many of those who were aligned against it two years ago are now in the forefront of the annexationists. T. J. O'Neil and James Fitzgerald, two of the former opponents of the movement are out for it this time good and strong.

It is said that the packing interests have signified their intention to favor the move. Petitions will be put into the hands of many persons who will circulate them amongst their friends. It is said that a number of business men have signified their willingness to back the movement, asserting that the present tax rate is altogether too high.

The annexation plan has several different sides, according to many down here. "Doc" Tanner, defeated candidate for sheriff, is said by some to be strongly in favor of the movement, while others assert that he is in a receptive mood towards the annexationists, but will await their invitation to come in.

The leaders are confident that the popular vote for annexation will have no opposition from any source other than the office holders, some of whom are known to favor the change.

Barber Shop Owner Fined Ten Dollars

Louis Rentfrow of the Windsor Hotel Shop Fined, but Barbers Who Do Work Are Dismissed.

Louis Rentfrow, proprietor of the Windsor hotel barber shop, was fined \$10 and costs for violating the Sunday closing ordinance, Tuesday morning. His two barbers who did the work on Sunday, September 1, were dismissed. Two complaints were also filed by C. M. Pleder against A. L. Pardon, proprietor of the Henshaw hotel barber shop, and one of his employees, John Scott, but a continuance was taken until Wednesday, September 20.

According to evidence introduced by the plaintiffs in the trial against Rentfrow, three men were shaved on September 1, but the barbers refused to take the money, telling the customers to put the 15 cents in the cash register themselves.

TILE FLOOR LAYERS QUIT WORK AT COURT HOUSE

Superintendent Says He Expects to Have Men to Take Their Places Soon.

Eight tile floor layers quit their jobs in the new county building Monday evening because they thought they were not receiving enough pay for their work. A gang of eight wood flooring workers was laid off on order of Superintendent Dan Shane and John Latenser, architect, because they were not doing their work properly. Superintendent Shane said Tuesday morning that other men to take the places of those who are off the work will be hired within a day or two and the trouble will not add materially to the delay of completion of the new building.

Prices of Apples Forced Downward

Bountiful Crops in Douglas County Bring Fruit Within Reach of Moderate Purse.

Bountiful crops in Douglas county orchards have brought the price of apples in local stores down as low as 40 cents a bushel—not for windfalls, but for sound, picked fruit. Larger, better colored fruit can be had at 50 to 60 cents a bushel. The price would be lower yet, say the dealers, were it not for the fact that many of the orchards have been bought outright by packers.

Peaches and pears are advancing in price and those who can and preserve peaches are advised to buy them this week. Reasonable prices on blue plums are anticipated.

PETITION IS TAKEN FROM THIS BOGUS SOLICITOR

Investigation Shows that He Was Seeking Funds Under False Pretenses.

Bob Robinson, a young man of color, was rudely checked in a promising enterprise Tuesday by the Associated Charities. He had started to solicit in the city hall on a subscription list to be devoted to the needs of "Mrs. John Berger," supposed to be ill, poverty stricken and forlorn. Some one sent him into the charities office where his paper was confiscated. A visitor was sent to the address of "Mrs. Berger," Miss Binney, and found it in a good neighborhood, inhabited only by white folks and without poverty stricken families. Robinson was not held and may be continuing his soliciting. The circulation of any such petition is likely to be fraudulent, as families really in need are cared for by the authorities upon application or notification.

YOUNG MAN KILLED BY CARS

FREMONT, Neb., Sept. 12.—(Special.)—The body of an unidentified man was found on the Union Pacific tracks near North Bend station about 12:30 yesterday afternoon. There was nothing about the clothing by which he could be identified. He was a young fellow probably from 20 to 25 years old and his clothing was of a cheap quality. A through freight passed over the road shortly before the body was found and it is thought he was beating his way and fell from the rods or brake beams.
