News on All Sides Favors the Sellers More Than the Buyers.

LITTLE CORN IS NOW COMING IN

Wet Weather in Sections Keeps the Corn from Maturing and the Offerings Consequently Are Light.

OMAHA, Sept. 19, 1911.

On the whole, news both domestic and abroad, favors more the sellers than the buyers.

When the trade pressed the selling side, which was the case in the early part of the week, the market was absorbed by strong concerns.

Wet weather in sections has held the market of the corn very back and country offerings are light because corn raisers are not sure of the quality of corn.

Wheat was dull and opened with a weak tone, owing to a lack of buying and closing values were stronger.

Corn continues to rule steady, although there was a weaker tone during today's session.

Primary wheat receipts were 1,000,000 bushels and shipments were 730,000 bushels.

Primary corn receipts were 494,000 bushels and shipments were 70,000 bushels.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Distinctly Heavier Tone Develops in Securities Market.

TWO REASONS FOR MOVEMENT

Foreign Situation and Domestic Political Conditions Are Factors Which Are Most Influential During the Day.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—A distinctly heavier tone developed today in the securities market.

The advance of the German rate of exchange from 1 to 2 per cent was in no sense a surprise.

While the most bullish forecasts of what the president was to say in regard to the situation in Germany were not borne out, the attitude of the national administration as thus outlined seemed to be responsible for much of the day's selling.

The pressure against United States Steel in the industry are at low ebb. Operations of the United States Steel Corporation are being curtailed.

Opening prices of stocks were generally lower, with some losses as much as a dollar and a half.

The bond market was steady. Total sales of United States bonds were \$1,764,000.
