NEW YORK, Sept. 21-The annual report of the Missouri Pacific Rallway company for the year ending June 30, 1911, shows a deficit of \$5,232,539. Gross earnings decreased only \$242,544, the total be-Totals ... 13 8 27 17 4 lng \$52,776,592. Operating expenses increased \$5,782,564.

The greater part of the deficit results from unadjusted claims and the settlement of judgment suits of previous years, together with what is stated to be a readjustment of a previous overvaluation of working assets. A portion of the deficit is also owing to the increase in the rates of pay of trainmen and all classes of labor, which, after mediation and arbitration, the company conceded in 1910.

Net income shows a decrease of \$6,657,-216, with a decrease in the net surplus of \$7,991,950. The surplus, which was \$15,685,587 a year ago, has been reduced to \$9,148,252 for the Missouri Pacific. In the case of the St. Louis & Iron Mountain road, an important part of the Missouri Pacific system, the surplus is cut from \$1,425,397 to \$111,968

ENGINEERS DENY THE REPORT Residents of Western Part of City to Petition for Purchase of a New

Park-Republican Club

That the Burlington railroad may expend \$500,000 in making a short cut from Q street to Layton's farm was the report that gained circulation yesterday. Engineers at the Burlington main office denied seek a safe retreat. The accident was that for the present such a project is in the result.

According to those who claim to be in touch with the situation at this end the work is about to begin, according to plans laid out by the road engineers. It is understood to be the desire of the railroad people to eliminate the curves and steep grades that now make the traffic difficult at this point. A straight cut from the Thirty-second street bridge to Layton's farm will obliterate the present objectionable features. The cost of such an undertaking will, it is said, approximate some where between \$500,000 and \$750,000.

At the Burlington headquarters the engineer's office denied any knowledge of the project. "We do not know of it," said one of the officials, "and I think if the work were being contemplated at this fourteen other members of the local Redtime we would already have been informed.
