Missouri Pacific Rebuilds Its Omaha-Kansas City Line

"By the first of next year the Missouri Pacific will have the best line of road between Omaha and Kansas City." Such is the statement of General Superintendent DeBernard of St. Louis, who is in charge of the western lines of the company and who is in the city after having made an inspection of the lines and the improvements that are being pushed to completion before winter sets in.

According to Superintendent DeBernard, the Missouri Pacific road between Omaha and Kansas City has been practically rebuilt since the election of President Bush. When President Bush took charge of the road last July, his first order was to put the Omaha-Kansas City line in the best possible condition, regardless of cost.

As to the annual report of the Missouri Pacific, showing a deficit of almost \$2,500,000 during the last fiscal year, Superintendent DeBernard expresses the opinion that it does not come about by reason of poor business, but by reason of charging off a lot of old claims that have never been carried along, but have now been disposed of under the change in methods inaugurated by President Bush.

Plead Guilty to Get Away from the Dope

Escape from the clutches of "dope" will be sought behind prison bars by Ed Cherrington and John Ell, two young men who pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering before Judge Willis G. Sears, Thursday.

Since their arrest, September 14, for breaking into a Northwestern railroad box car and stealing fifty-four bottles of beer they have been in the county jail awaiting trial. Thursday they begged Jailor Osborne to get them into court at once, that they might plead guilty and be sent to the penitentiary.

Flanagan, Sheriff Bralley and others were reluctant to discuss the deputy's journey Thursday. It was evident they believe publicity would do more harm than good at this time.

RETURNS TO BIRTHPLACE AFTER FORTY YEARS

"When I left Omaha forty years ago to seek my fortune elsewhere, the old town looked different by far than it now does," said Edward J. Wilcox, representative of a New York cutlery firm, who is a guest at the Millard, and who returned to the place of his birth for the first time, since he left here in 1871, at the age of 15.

"I was born on Harney street, near Tenth, but the house has long since been destroyed. There were few big buildings and Omaha was little more than a thriving burg," as he remembers it. "Now it is such a bustling place that it hardly seems possible that it is the Omaha in which I used to live. All of my old playmates are gone and there are few old landmarks that I recognize."

MANY TO PASS THROUGH OMAHA TO LAND OPENING

Omaha roads are figuring on carrying 2,000 to 3,000 to Bennett and Mellette counties, South Dakota, between October 1 and 21, the dates set for registering for the land formerly a part of the Sioux Indian reservation that is to be thrown open to settlement. BIG REALTY DEAL IS CLOSED

Union Stock Yards Company Buys Sixty South Omaha Lots.

TO ERECT LARGE STOCK BARN

Site Costs in Neighborhood of \$60,000 and the Horse and Mule Barn Will Require an Outlay of About \$100,000.

Negotiations for the purchase of sixty lots on which the Union Stock Yards company will erect a 100,000 horse and mule barn have been closed by that concern through its agent, Joseph Mallander. The purchase prices are not given out, but it is estimated that at least \$60,000 was spent to acquire the property.

The sixty lots form a triangle, the base of which parallels the north end of the stock yards. The parcels were acquired from individuals and much time has been consumed in the negotiations. Thirty-two of the lots were bought in the name of Mary Botke, who is a relative of Mallander.

The proposed construction of the barn was published some time ago in The Bee. It probably will be the largest structure of its kind in the United States. The barn will be built of concrete and brick and there will be two floors.

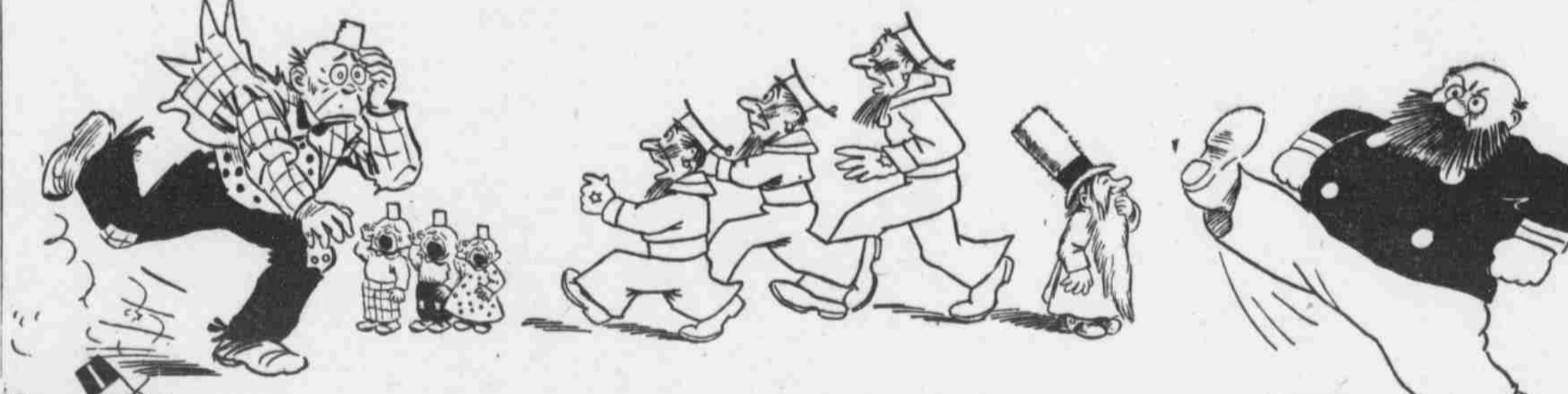
