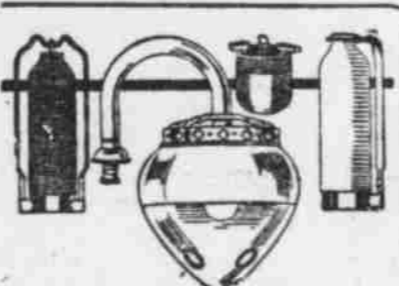

MINISTERS ELECT DELEGATES

Choose Men to Represent Them at General Conference.

LAY DELEGATES ALSO MEET

Will Select Their Delegates to the Convention at Plymouth Congregational Church.

Delegates from the North Nebraska conference to the general conference to be held in Minneapolis next May were elected at Friday morning's business session. The three delegates elected were Rev. C. N. Dawson, D. D. of Omaha, Rev. William Kaplan of Arlington and Rev. E. T. George, D. D., superintendent of the Nealg district.

Mr. Dawson served for fifteen years in the Omaha ministry. He was minister at the old South Tenth street church, now the Dietz Memorial, for a number of years. After that he was in charge of the South Omaha church, for three years, and the Walnut Hill church for five years. He was also pastor of the Senate Street church for a number of years. Mr. George was pastor of the Trinity church for one year.

The laymen met in the Plymouth Congregational church at 12:30 and organized. The business taken up was the nominating of lay delegates to the general conference. When the session closed at noon all the nominations had been made, and the election of three delegates from the nine nominees held over to be taken up at the afternoon meeting. Those nominated were John Dale of the Hancock Park church, B. H. Paine of Grand Island, Oscar Johnson of Laurel, Richard Connell of Allen, O. O. Snyder of O'Neil, George T. Lindley of the Walnut Hill

Some wanted each layman to nominate three delegates by ballot, while others favored a motion to nominate by voice, and state why their man should go as a delegate. Finally it was decided to nominate by voice and vote by informal ballot, leaving the nominations open for ten minutes.
