

What Women Are Doing in the World

MRS. MANY HARRIS ARMOR of Georgia, one of the most ardent and efficient white ribbons in the country, will be the principal speaker at the Nebraska State Woman's Christian Temperance union convention at McCook, September 25 to 28. Mrs. A. M. is remembered by many Omahans from having debated with Mayor Dahlman on the liquor question at a Bellevue chautauqua several years ago and from having taken a prominent part in the debates of the National Woman's Christian Temperance union convention held in Omaha in 1909.

The convention will open Monday evening with a general officers' meeting. The address of the president, Mrs. Francis H. Head, will come, while this club will elect officers and delegates to the national convention in Milwaukee and to the world's convention on Thursday.
