Panic in Tripoli.

MALTA, Sept. 27 - A private message from Tripoli today says that Italian war-

ships with an expeditionary force are lying twenty miles off Tripoli and that there is a panic among the Italian regidents there, as it is feared that the landing of troops will be the signal for a massacre of Europeans.

The Anglo-Maitese colony in Tripoli today sent an appeal to their compatrious, saying:

"We emplore your brethern to appeal to the government to assist us and to come to our help, as the Italian steamers refuse to receive any but persons of their own nationality."
