Women to Enter Golf Competition for Cox Guerdon

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—The competition for the women's amateur golf championship of the United States, open to all women amateur golfers belonging to clubs which are members of the United States Golf association, and to those foreigners visiting this country who may be invited by the executive committee of the association, will be played on the course of the Baltusrol Golf club, Baltusrol, N. J., commencing on Monday, October 2, when the Robert Cox cup and four medals will be competed for under the rules of the United States Golf association. The winner of the competition shall be the champion woman amateur golfer for the year, and the Robert Cox cup shall be held for that year by the club from which the winner shall have entered. The winner shall receive a gold medal, the runner-up a silver medal, and the other semi-finalists, bronze medals. The contestants will play eighteen holes. The tourney will conclude on October 14. The program for the week is as follows:

October 5, 10 a. m.—Women's championship medal play round. Eighteen holes. Prize presented by the association for the lowest score in this competition. October 10, 10 a. m.—Women's championship, first match play round; 1:30 p. m. consolation event for the non-qualifiers. Eighteen holes, medal play, handicap. Prize presented by the Baltusrol Golf club. Entries close for this event Monday, October 9, at 8 p. m.

October 12, 10 a. m.—Women's championship, second match play round; 1:30 p. m. women's handicap against bogey. Eighteen holes. Prize presented by the Baltusrol Golf club. Entries close for this event at 1 p. m.

October 13, 10 a. m.—Women's championship, semi-final match play round; 1:30 p. m. best ball foursome, scratch. Eighteen holes. Prize presented by the Baltusrol Golf club. Post entries.

October 14, 10 a. m.—Women's championship, final match play round; 1:30 p. m. member foursome medal play handicap. Eighteen holes. Prize presented by the Baltusrol Golf club. Entries can be made for this event Thursday, October 12, at 8 p. m.
