Last Communion in Old North Presbyterian to Be Held Sunday.

### SUNDAY SCHOOLS HOLD RALLIES

Walnut Hill Methodist and Immanuel Baptist Young People Offer Addresses, Music and Recitations.

The last communion in the building of the North Presbyterian church at Nineteenth and Ohio streets will be held Sunday morning at 10:30. New members will be received and baptized.

The building has been in use for more than a quarter of a century. It was used by the Knox Presbyterian church until three years ago, when it was taken by the North congregation, a union of the Knox and Second Presbyterian churches.

The new \$40,000 building at Twenty-fourth and Wirt streets will be ready for occupancy by January 1, the time for the next communion. The auditorium will seat 570 and the Sunday school room 450. A pipe organ costing several thousand dollars will be installed. Finances of the new building are in excellent condition and it is hoped it may be dedicated free of debt.

Sunday will be rally day for the Walnut Hill Methodist Sunday school, Forty-first and Charles streets. A special rally day service will be held at 10:30 in the morning, the orchestra and the junior and primary departments participating.

The orchestra will offer the overture from "Rust and Pansies." "A Russian Hymn," "Souvenir," a selection from "The Bell of Normandy" and solos by Miss Madge West. Recitations and music by Alice Day, Gladys Messenger, Lillian Armstrong, Anita Edmonson, Florence Richardson, Charles Trillock, McKee Fisk and others will comprise the junior department program. The little ones will appear in songs and recitations. Among them will be Maurice Vest, Marjorie

Yoder, Georgia Sandberg and Edward Gordon.

The Sunday school of the Immanuel Baptist church will hold a rally Sunday morning at 10:15. The program will include selections by the school orchestra, "Seek Ye the Lord," gospel hymns and other numbers, songs, recitations and solos. Among those who will appear are Henry Lower Ruth Hartman, Frances Patten, Gertrude Blomquist, Miriam Kitch, Jessie Hill and Walter Tuttle.

Charles A. Alden of the University of Omaha will give an address, "The Boy and the Bible," and the pastor, Rev. Mr. Eberole, will speak on "Looking Forward."

Rev. Charles H. Fleming, the new pastor of the Fairview Presbyterian church and the Presbyterian Church of the Covenant, has taken up his new duties and will appear in the pulpits of the two churches for the first time Sunday. Rev. Mr. Fleming will have charge of the morning and evening services in the Church of the Covenant, preaching in the evening on "John and Mark."

At the Fairview church he will preach the same sermon in the afternoon at the usual service hour.

Dr. Charles A. Alden, financial secretary of the University of Omaha, will speak on "A Business Man's Religion" at the Third Presbyterian church Sunday evening. At the morning service Prof. Walter Halsey of the University of Omaha will speak.

The quartet of St. Mary's Avenue Congregational church will render a special program of sacred song in the first musical service of the season on Sunday evening, October 2. Selections will be rendered covering works by great composers. The quartet is under the direction of Mr. R. T. Gersey, with the following numbers: Miss Martha Gryn, soprano; Mrs. F. S. Welty, contralto; J. R. Hopkins, tenor; R. T. Kersey, bass; C. L. Cooke, Jr., organist.
