Christian Churches of Omaha, South Omaha and Bluffs Meet Tuesday.

RAIL STRIKE SERMON SUBJECT

Rev. E. B. Crawford Begins Series of Sermons on Preacher-Poets—Men and Religion Forward Movement Discussed.

The Tri-City Federation of Christian Churches of Omaha, South Omaha, Irvington and Council Bluffs will meet at the First Christian church, Omaha, Tuesday, October 10. Lunch will be served at 12 o'clock.

The semi-annual convention of the Omaha and Douglas county Sunday schools will be held at the Young Men's Christian association next Monday afternoon and evening.

Dr. R. W. Shepard of St. Louis will deliver addresses at both sessions. During the afternoon there will be an elementary workers' meeting, which is expected to be one of the largest and most enthusiastic ever held in the city.

The Men and Religion Forward Movement will be discussed by several Omaha ministers Sunday, the subject being handled from a different angle by each.

Strike of the federated crafts of the Harriman lines, and the Illinois Central railroad in particular, and the present epidemic of strikes among laborers in general will be discussed by Rev. G. W. Abbott, pastor of Trinity Methodist church, Twenty-first and Binney streets, Sunday morning.

The Epworth league of the Diets Memorial Methodist church will hold a rally and special song service Sunday evening at 7:30. President Lewis of the District Epworth league will give an address on the work of the organization and its several departments.

The opening sermon of a series of four on "The Preacher Poets" by Rev. E. B.
