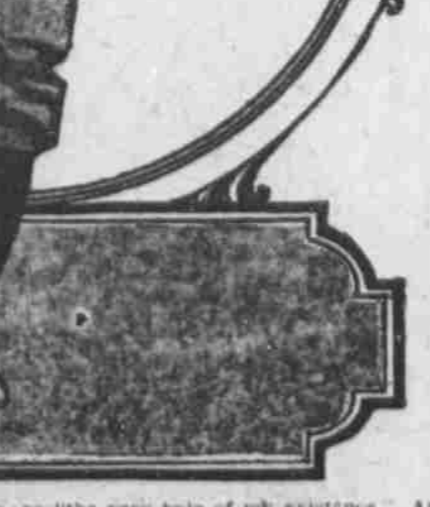
### ST. LOUIS CLOSING SEASON BY TAKING EASY DOUBLE-HEADER.

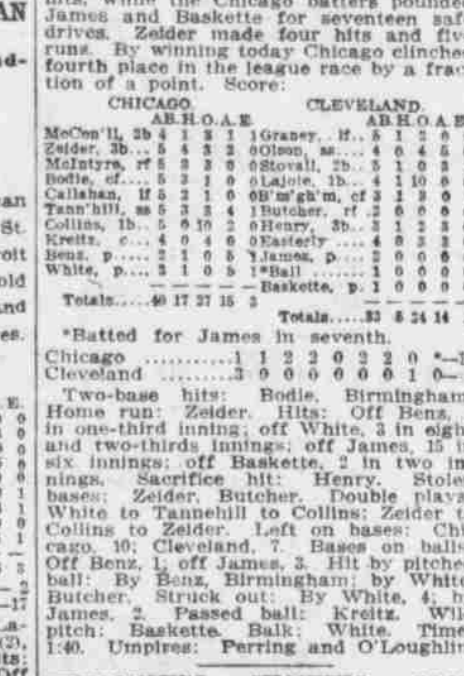
