She Helps Young Women Find Work and Homes. Miss Marie Odiorne is the secretary of the Young Women's Christian association whose job it is to fit self-supporting girls into the right places. This sounds easy, but is really very difficult. For the reason that so many of the girls who are just starting out on their careers as wage earners are unfitted for the places which they wish to get, and because employers will not hire beginners. Nearly every inexperienced applicant who comes to Miss Odiorne wants office work, and office managers want only experienced workers. None of the girls will take places to do housework. And there is always a super-abundance of places of that kind. The calls from housewives who need cooks, second girls, and maids for general housework are as numerous as those from the inexperienced girls who want to do office work. Miss Odiorne discouraged with the task of trying to balance employees and employers? Not in the least. She is hopeful because she believes that the growing popularity of domestic science training will help to solve the problem by teaching girls to do housework in a scientific way, thus diffusing it and lessening the dislike for it. In addition to her duties as employment secretary Miss Odiorne assists young women, especially those who are strangers in the city, in finding suitable boarding places, the association having no boarding home of its own. Miss Odiorne is particularly interested in the establishing of boarding houses in connection with the association buildings. Miss Odiorne has been a Young Women's Christian association secretary for over twenty years. She understands girls and spends her time helping them. She came from the association in Grand Rapids, Mich., to take charge of the employment bureau and boarding house department of the Omaha Young Women's Christian association.
