APPLE CROPS ARE IMMENSE

Wheat Purmerly Was the Principal Industry, but Washington to New Known as a Diversified Farming Country.

Visitors at the Land Show never pass slong the central nists of the Colleger best stopping to admire the wonderful fruit and vegetable duplay made by the sitisons of the Walls Walls valley, in the state of Washington, an exhibit that is in charge of L. M. Brown, publicity manager of the Walla Walla Commergini ciub.

While the site of the city of Walla-Walls marks one of the first white settlements in the west, its great growth is of recent date. As early as 1810 the Hudson hay company established a post where the city of Walla Walla now stands, there trading with the Indians. Later and in 1880 the intrepld explorer, Marcus Whitman, conducted a party across the plains and over the mountains, eventually locating at Walla Walla. From that time on the city has been en the map and has attracted attention all over the country. In 1802 the city was incorporated and shortly afterward the settlers commenced to flock in. Central R. Frazier, one of the early settiers, coming from Missouri, realizing the possibilities of the valley as a fruitgrowing section, planted an apple tree that he had brought with him. This tree still stands where it was planted in 1848 and has been bearing apples annually for more than fifty years. It is perfectly sound and in healthy condition. having been pronounced so by Prof. Lake of the Agricultural department. It has been bearing from 100 to 125 bushels of apples annually for the last twenty years. It is fifty-seven feet in height and measures seventy-six feet from tip to tip. So far as known, this is the

dustry, which has grown by leaps and bounds until now, when this year the apple product of the state aggregated in round numbers 5,509,000 bushels. For many years wheat raising was

the leading industry, farmers believing that it was the only money maker. However, a number of years ago diversified farming was tried and it at once proved such a success that while wheat is still the principal cereal, all varieties of small grains are raised with great profit. Around the city of Walla Walla are

probably many of the largest apple orchards in the world. In close proximity are those of the Walla Walla Apple Land company, 7,000 acres; the Blalock Fruit company, 1,500 acres; the Baker-Langdon orchards, 570 acres, and the famous Pomons orchards, which last year produced 94,000 bushels.

The Walla Walla apples find a market almost every country of the world, and to libustrate it is only necessary to mention that growers in the vicinity of Newtown have standing orders with English apple dealers to ship 1,000 barrels

Last year the city of Walla Walla shipped 1,800 cars of apples, 1,000 of vegetables and hundreds of carloads of alfalfa hay, indicating that farmers do not depend upon fruit alone.

The famous and fertile Walla Walla and in it, reached by steam and trolley roads, are the presperous cities of Milton, Free Water, Walksburg, Dayton and rescott, besides the city of Walla Walla. In this valley, in addition to the grain fields and apple orchards, the people are rateing every known variety of vegetaliles, punches, pears, prunes, apricots, cherries, and all of the berries to be found in the temperate zone.

In many ways the city of Walla Walla is unique. In fact, it is in the heart of an old settled community. The city is built along the lines of older cities of the east, with great shade trees on either wide of the streets. There are miles of paved streets and one of the best equipped electric car lines in the state. The city is noted for its educational ad-Vantages.
