Wonderful Fruit and Vegetable Exhibit at Land Show.

APPLE CROPS ARE IMMENSE

Wheat Formerly Was the Principal Industry, but Washington is Now Known as a Diversified Farming Country.

Visitors at the Land Show never pass along the central aisle of the Coliseum without stopping to admire the wonderful fruit and vegetable display made by the citizens of the Walla Walla valley, in the state of Washington, an exhibit that is in charge of L. M. Brown, publicity manager of the Walla Walla Commercial club.

While the site of the city of Walla Walla marks one of the first white settlements in the west, its great growth is of recent date. As early as 1819 the Hudson Bay company established a post where the city of Walla Walla now stands, there trading with the Indians. Later and in 1840 the intrepid explorer, Marcus Whitman, conducted a party across the plains and over the mountains, eventually locating at Walla Walla. From that time on the city has been on the map and has attracted attention all over the country. In 1862 the city was incorporated and shortly afterward the settlers commenced to flock in. Central B. Frasier, one of the early settlers, coming from Missouri, realizing the possibilities of the valley as a fruit-growing section, planted an apple tree that he had brought with him. This tree still stands where it was planted in 1840 and has been bearing apples annually for more than fifty years. It is perfectly sound and in healthy condition, having been pronounced so by Prof. Lake of the Agricultural department. It has been bearing from 100 to 125 bushels of apples annually for the last twenty years. It is fifty-seven feet in height and measures seventy-six feet from tip to tip. So far as known, this is the largest apple tree in the world.

The Apple Industry. The planting of the one tree marked the beginning of Washington's apple industry, which has grown by leaps and bounds until now, when this year the apple product of the state aggregated in round numbers 5,000,000 bushels.

For many years wheat raising was the leading industry, farmers believing that it was the only money maker. However, a number of years ago diversified farming was tried and it at once proved such a success that while wheat is still the principal cereal, all varieties of small grains are raised with great profit.

Around the city of Walla Walla are probably many of the largest apple orchards in the world. In close proximity are those of the Walla Walla Apple Land company, 7,000 acres; the Blalock Fruit company, 1,500 acres; the Baker-Langdon orchards, 579 acres, and the famous Pomeroy orchards, which last year produced 8,000 bushels.

The Walla Walla apples find a market in almost every country of the world, and to illustrate it is only necessary to mention that growers in the vicinity of Newtown have standing orders with English apple dealers to ship 1,000 barrels annually.

Last year the city of Walla Walla shipped 1,800 cars of apples, 1,000 of vegetables and hundreds of carloads of alfalfa hay, indicating that farmers do not depend upon fruit alone.

The famous and fertile Walla Walla valley contains 2,500 square miles of fertile land, most of it as level as a floor, and in it, reached by steam and trolley roads, are the prosperous cities of Milton, Free Water, Walksburg, Dayton and Prescott, besides the city of Walla Walla. In this valley, in addition to the grain fields and apple orchards, the people are raising every known variety of vegetables, peaches, pears, prunes, apricots, cherries, and all of the berries to be found in the temperate zone.

Walla Walla is Unique. In many ways the city of Walla Walla is unique. In fact, it is in the heart of an old settled community. The city is built along the lines of older cities of the east, with great shade trees on either side of the streets. There are miles of paved streets and one of the best equipped electric car lines in the state. The city is noted for its educational advantages. It is the seat of the famous Whitman college, founded in 1862; the Adventist college, Mt. Episcopal school, two Catholic academies, La Salle and St. Vincent; Ferron academy, besides the splendid public and two private schools of music. It is the only city of its size in the country that has and supports a symphony orchestra. All of the school buildings are modern and of brick and stone construction. The city is the site of the state home of Odd Fellows, and here is located the Shubbsfield home for children and aged persons.

Near the city of Walla Walla, the states of Idaho, Oregon and Washington have purchased a large tract of land, where is being created the Tri-State Home for the Aged. Here the Knights of Pythias have erected their state lodge building, a modern fireproof structure.

Relative to the climate of central Washington, the winters are mild, while the summers are most delightful, with long, comfortable days and cool nights. The normal temperature of winter is 26 degrees and of summer 71. The annual rainfall averages seventeen to twenty-five inches.

BUSTING TRUST HE FORMS
J. Fred Kerr Withdraws from the Abstractors' Association.

IS SORE AT THE COMBINATION
Says that Prices Were Raised When the Association Was Formed and that it Was Practically a Trust.

The Bee's story some time ago that an abstractors' trust held the real estate business of Omaha in its clutches, though it was denied by the abstractors strenuously at the time, is true, according to J. Fred Kerr, who admits that he was one of the organizers of the trust, but says now that he is "sore" and intends to bust it.

When the abstractors' association was organized on June 1, according to Mr. Kerr, prices were raised 25 to 30 per cent. An agreement was reached, he says, whereby the price quoted to anyone on an abstract was telephoned to other abstract offices, so that the customer was given the same price wherever he went. Mr. Kerr is sending out circular letters to real estate men, in which he says:

As a real estate agent you are interested in prices for abstracts of title. Since June 1, 1911, the prices of abstracts have been materially higher by reason of the formation of a trust agreement between the abstractors. The Kerr Abstract company has this day withdrawn from said agreement and will from now on, continue as in the past, furnishing the best abstracts, but at more reasonable prices.

Ahkko Discharged Following Raid

Louis Ahkko and his head waiter, Charles Mebourne, who were arrested Thursday night when Ahkko's chop suey house at 1419 Douglas street was raided by the police, were discharged in police court Friday morning. When the place was raided a partly filled barrel of beer was found on the premises and it was confiscated. In police court Charles Lynch of Lincoln, Neb., swore that he had given Ahkko money to buy the beer before 5 o'clock and that he was giving a party. He said he did not buy the beer from Ahkko.
