### CORN AT FABULOUS PRICE

Two Cars of White Ears Sell for Seventy and One-Half Cents.

#### WHEAT REACHES HIGH POINT

Nebraska Product, Sold by Nebraska-Iowa Grain Company, Sells for \$1.05, Highest Price of the Year.

Two cars of white corn sold on the Omaha Grain exchange Friday at 79 1/2 cents a bushel and one car of wheat was disposed of at \$1.05, the highest figure reached by either product this year.

Corn has advanced 5 to 6 cents a bushel since October 1, the quotations on white corn today being 79 1/2 cents to 79 3/4 cents, and on No. 2 color corn 69 1/2 cents to 70 cents. Some dealers say that some mysterious influence is "bulling" the market, others say prices are going up because old corn is scarce and the new crop is not yet harvested.

The wheat that brought \$1.05 was No. 2 mixed, Nebraska wheat, sold by the Nebraska-Iowa Grain company. The Deal-Vincent company sold a car of No. 2 hard at \$1.04 1/2. The nominal range of No. 2 hard is \$1.02 1/2 to \$1.04 1/2. Oats are advancing, but not at the same rate as corn. Standard oats today are quoted at 46 1/2 cents to 46 3/4 cents, or 1 cent higher than on October 1.
