## OMAHA FLOUR GOES TO NEW YORK AND BOSTON

Ten thousand barrels of flour, made in Omaha, were sold Friday by the Updike Milling company to a New York jobbing house for New York and Boston consumption. "Several large orders of the 'Pride of Omaha' have been placed in the east of late," said N. B. Updike, president of the company. "We are more than pleased that the east is awakening to the fact that Nebraska can make as good flour as any state in the union. The plant is now being pushed to fill orders."

## Grand Prize Race at Savannah Will Draw Over 100 Cars

SAVANNAH, Ga., Oct. 21.—The automobile road races at the end of next month will bring out more fast cars than ever have been seen at any previous meeting of this character. There were forty-five entrants in the 500-mile race at Indianapolis. According to the promoters there will be at least 100 cars in the Grand Prize, Vanderbilt, Savannah Challenge Trophy and Tiedeman Cup races at the Georgian auto carnival.

The grand prize is to be run on Thanksgiving day, November 23, and the other races run together on Monday, November 27. The manufacturers who have given assurances so far that they will enter and the number promised are as follows: Lozier, 2; Abbott, Detroit, 4; Mercer, 3; Cole, 2; Ohio, 2; Marmon, 4; Fiat, 5; Benz, 3; Buick, 2; Pope Hummer, 2; Mercedes, 1; Sears, 3; Opel, 1; Colby,

2; Staver, 3; Metallurgique, 1; S. G. V., 1; Case, 2; Ford, Westcott and Velle, undetermined.

Many other manufacturers are corresponding with the officers of the Savannah club with a view to the entry of cars in one of the four races in a manner appearing to bear out the assumption of President Granger that there will be 100 cars here for the races in the largest aggregation of racing cars ever gathered on one course in America.

The latest information received is that Joe Jagerberger and J. D. McNay will drive the Case cars which have been entered in the Savannah challenge trophy race. Ralph De Palma will drive one of the Mercer cars and will also drive a Lozier in the grand prize. Spencer E. Wishart will drive the Mercedes.

The Savannah Automobile club has added \$1,500 as second and third prizes in the Vanderbilt and the two light car races, making the total amount of prize money offered by the club \$11,000. In addition to these cash prizes is the \$5,000 grand prize cup, the Vanderbilt cup and other valuable plaques to go to the winners. The Remy Magneto company has

led off for the accessory concerns with an offer of \$4,700 in cash prizes, and other tire, oil and accessory manufacturers have signified their intention of offering substantial cash amounts to the winners, until the lucky drivers will carry off good sized money bags in addition to the glory incident to winning the greatest road races in the world.
