CHINA AN AWAKENING GIANT

Dobson Says Revolt Identified with Christian Movement.

MISSIONARIES DO BIG WORK

Due to Converted Chinese-Empire Too Great for Mind to Grasp.

China, the giant of the world, who has been asleep for centuries, is awakening. and when fully aroused will stir this world as it has never been stirred before. China is one of the greatest countries on earth, if not the greatest, and the world knows least about it. The present uprising will succeed if the people can get the necessary arms. Its success will be the greatest benefit that can possibly come to the people. The Christian religion is what has aroused the sleeping American missionaries have sounded the trumpets that have disturbed the sleeper. They have awakened the spirit of liberty that has caused this rebellion of the new against the old, and every man and woman in America who believes in the gospel of Christ should feel a personal interest in the success of

this uprising. These were some of the declarations made in an hour's address yesterday afternoon at the Young Men's Christian association building by George L. Dobson, former United States consul at Hankow, China, and for four years Iowa's secretary of state. Mr. Dobson paused in his duties at Des Moines, where he is now treasurer of Polk county, and came to Council Bluffs to give two addresses for the purpose of promoting the foreign

missionary movement. Missionary Work Important. Mr. Dobson dwelt largely upon the im portance and extent of the missionary work in the Celestial kingdom, and declared that the greatest part of it is being done by the Methodist churches of the United States. The missionaries have started the work and it has gone on gathering strength and weight like a huge snowball or an avalanche. The missionaries are the leaders and teachers. The real work is being done by the converted Chinese. They have started an enormous energy that cannot stop until it sweeps over the whole kingdom and comes to rest after completely changing everything in the social and religious lives of a people that has withstood the assaults of thousands of years. It is the greatest place on earth for one to realize the virility and strength of

China is accredited with having 350,000,000 people, but no one knows within 100,000,000 of the number. There has never been a census taken of the country.
