Former Athlete Leaps Two Stories to Death

PORTLAND Ore. Oct. 23 -Ralph Dim tck, a young lawyer of this city and well known in the Pacific northwest and in the middle west as an athlete, met death early today while delivious, by jumping from the second story of a fire escape of a local hospital.

Dimick, who contracted pneumonia ten days ago as the result of a foot ball game between college alumni and stuients of the Pacific university at Forest Grove, had been out of his mind. During the momentary absence of his nurse. Dimick jumped from bed, climbed out of the window and leaped from the fire escape. Alighting he ran several hundred feet at great speed before dropping exhausted. The distance he fell was not great, but in his weakened condition he was unable to stand the shock. He was dead when picked up.
