GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Heavy Selling of Long Wheat Does Not Seem to Affect Values

TENDENCY TO OVERSELL CORN

Extensive Holdings Have Been Liquidated and Heavy Heading and Short Sales Are Made

Market on Good Basis.

OMAHA, October 26, 1911. In spite of the heavy selling of long wheat that has been going on all this week, values are still slightly lower than the top prices of the last week.

Wheat ruled easy and weak throughout the week. Bids were short-lived and sentiment on the whole is favoring some further decline. Cash wheat was 4c lower.

Corn was slightly lower in sympathy with wheat and prospects of an early run of new corn started short selling.

Primary wheat receipts were 1,338,000 bushels, and shipments were 565,000 bushels against receipts last year of 4,400,000 bushels and shipments of 30,000 bushels.

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NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Operations in Stocks Center About the Steel Group.

SEVERE PRESSURE EXERTED

News of Government's Suit for Dissolution of Corporation Fails to Reach Wall Street During Business Hours.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Operations in stocks today centered about the steel group. The rate of discount in the open market of the market that knowledge of the government's suit for dissolution of the United States Steel Corporation reached Wall Street. Nevertheless, pressure against steel was constant and severe.

Something of a mystery was made of the special meeting of United States Steel directors in New York last night. The meeting was held in the city and the directors had met to give official sanction to the plan made known several days ago for converting the steel corporation into a trust.

United States Steel is now being nearly twenty-five points below the high price of last year. The decline has been generally attributed to the fact that the stock is held by holders who fear such an action as the government's suit for dissolution.
