State Board Does Not Destre to Bu; Addition to Land Used by State School for the

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 25 .- (Special.)-The Nebraska legislative bureau is preparing a condensed statement of regis tration laws in the different states fo the purpose of making comparisons with similar laws in Nebraska. Residents o cities in this state where registration is required by law are compelled to regis ter every year regardless of the fact that he may have lived in the same house for twenty-five years or more. In other states, according to the statement prepared by the bureau, permanent register of qualified voters is made and the registration board sits only for a short time each year for the purpose of correcting

Bills were introduced in the legislature last winter to provide for a permanen register in this state and for the cor rection of lists at the city clerk's office thereby enabling the matter to be gone through with more expeditiously. The bills, however, were not given the sancof the lawmakers and falled to pass. The cost of three days' registration in this city as shown by a statement of the city clerk is as follows:
