After Heavy Sales of Wheat More Confidence is Being Shown.

INFLUENCE FAVORING BEARS
Certain Degree of Bullishness in Corn Trade Because Movement of New Crop Has Been Light and Weather Unfavorable.

OMAHA, Oct. 30, 1911.
After the heavy selling of wheat last week more confidence was shown today and there was considerable re-planting of lately sold lines.

Unfavorable weather over the corn belt and the light movement of the new crop has kept the advance in corn prices from being as high.

Primary wheat receipts were 1,716,000 bu. and shipments were 2,200,000 bu. and receipts last year of 48,000 bu. and shipments of 52,000 bu.
