

CHANCELLOR DEFENDS ACT

Speech Before Reichstag in Behalf of Morocco Agreement Falls Flat.

PRINCE APPROVES CRITICISMS

Reply to German Throne Denies Afterward that He is Planning Action with Brothers Against Chancellor.

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—That Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg's position is badly shaken is the only possible verdict on today's debate in the Reichstag on the Morocco-Congo treaties.

The defection of the conservatives and clericals from the government's body-guard was an especially severe blow. Every speaker defended Dr. von Lindquist, who recently resigned as secretary of state for the colonies.

Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg explained his skill in explaining the great advantages of a friendly settlement with France to the future value of colonial acquisitions, and to disprove the reports that Germany had backed down before British menace.

Would Avoid War. After relating the representations made by Germany to Great Britain relative to the speech made by David Lloyd-George at a banquet given by the bankers of London July 21 last and to Anglo-French newspaper insinuations and the belittlement of the German people as a result of Mr. Lloyd-George's remarks, the German chancellor declared:

"Nobody can tell whether war some time will come, but my duty is to do what that war which is avoidable and not demanded by the honor of Germany must be avoided."

This statement called forth general applause.

The Franco-German crisis, the chancellor said, was so acute on approaching final settlement that, ending peacefully, it was worth more than all discussion or arbitration and disarmament.

Prince Opposes Chancellor.

The attention of the spectators in the galleries and the members of the Reichstag during and after the speeches made by Baron von Hartling, cleric, and Herr von Heydebrand, conservative, was attracted by the attitude of Crown Prince Frederick-William. The crown prince openly applauded the sentence "our peaceful professions are regarded abroad as a sign of weakness," and nodded approval at other critics of Herr von Bethmann-Hollweg's policy and tactics, notably with regard to the chancellor's attitude toward the resigned colonial secretary, Dr. Lindquist.

It was signed by the crown prince and issued from the court marshal's office.

Attacks on England.

The debate called out many sharp attacks on England, which were greeted with applause. The chief attack was made by Herr von Heydebrand and was astonishingly bellicose.

Referring to Chancellor Lloyd-George's well remembered speech, he said that Germany now knows where to find the enemy.

WIDOW ACCUSED OF MURDER

Chicago Woman Believed to Have Shot Husbands.

SON-IN-LAW GIVES TESTIMONY

Discharged Revolver Hidden Behind Bath tub Causes the Police to Doubt Story of Robber in Night.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—Witnesses today at the inquest held over the body of John Quinn, who was found shot to death in his home on the outskirts of the city November 2, gave testimony which threatened to involve the slain man's wife.

Charles E. Thorpe, a stepson by the woman's second marriage, told of three marriages he knew she had contracted, although in her former testimony she acknowledged only two.

That she had been married three times. That her second husband, Warren Thorpe, whom she married within two months of the death of her first, had been shot to death under circumstances not unlike Quinn's death.

That Thorpe on the day of his death contemplated arranging to deed his 10-acre farm to a son, but was shot while getting ready to go to a notary with his son.

That she visited Thorpe's home before her first husband was dead. That she and a daughter were held in custody after Thorpe's death, but were released.

That two boarders in the Quinn home on the night of the shooting, neither until they were awakened by policemen and questioned about it.
