### New Books

**THE CONFLICT.** By David Graham Phillips. 320 Pp. \$1.30. D. Appleton & Co.

A city in the middle west furnishes the setting for the story, the theme of which involves the rivalries and personalities of different leaders who are engaged in furthering political reform. The heroine is the daughter of a wealthy "capitalist boss." She is attracted by the labor leader, the son of a carpenter, who opposes her father's political ambitions. Circumstances bring about a declaration from her of her love for this man; but he, although sharing her passion, overcomes the temptation, explains to her that their missions are too far apart for them to be happy together, and they part.

**VIRGINIA OF THE RHODESIANS.** By Cynthia Stockley. 274 Pp. \$1.25. Dana Estes & Co.

The scene of this story is laid in South Africa. The heroine is most charming and alluring, and the book is clever, yet the reader feels none of the lure of the east. The atmosphere is that described by Kipling, when he says that east of Suez there are no ten commandments.

**THE HEART OF A WOMAN.** By Barncress Greay. 321 Pp. \$1.25. Hodges & Stoughton.

The story of the mystery of a taxicab, which goes from one amazing sensation to another. There are no loose ends in the narrative, and the interest is maintained throughout the book.

**DIVIDING WATERS.** By J. A. R. Wylie. 284 Pp. \$1.25. Bobbs-Merrill Company.

The story of a young English girl married to a German army officer makes the book thoroughly interesting. The characters are alive, and beneath the romantic interest there is constantly present the author's aim—the reconciliation of English and Germans, to the end that international peace may be observed.

**DEMOND ROIRKE, IRISHMAN.** By John Haslette. 322 Pp. \$1.30. D. Appleton & Co.

An adventurous Irishman devises a plan to sell an imaginary silver mine in Martinique. His scheme is clever, his personality baffling; a case owner and a

Yankee millionaire vie with each other for the property. But when success looms big the Irishman must need fall in love with the case man's daughter. And then trouble—and fun—begins.

**SUCH A WOMAN.** By Owen and Leita Kildare. 216 Pp. \$1.35. G. W. Billington Company.

The story of how one earnest man started a mission in the wretchedest quarter of the east side and of the methods he took to overcome the indifference, the pride, the caste enmity which met him wherever he turned. Time, patience, much hard work and constant, loving thought were at last successful and his "Wayside Inn" became all that he had hoped it would be and so far broke down the barriers of caste that he himself finally found his helpmeet in one of those he had regenerated.

**DR. DAVID.** By Marjorie Benton Cooke. 285 Pp. A. C. McClurg & Co.

When the strong personality of Dr. David Porter comes into the faded society atmosphere of Nanette Brandon, wife of Philip Brandon, business man, the reader feels, and rightly, that something is going to happen. How the good doctor and a good woman, "serenity," change the whole course of life of this married couple and others as well, is skillfully wrought out in the way one wishes it accomplished.

**FOUR BOYS IN THE YOSEMITE.** By Everett T. Tomlinson. 46 Pp. \$1.50. Lothrop, Lee & Shepard Company.

A story of the experiences of four boys who are spending their vacation in the place called by some travelers the most impressive and wonderful in the world. In the story are adventures, mountain climbing, explorations, conching, and exciting experiences among the tremendous crags and cliffs.

The historical element is not lacking. How the valley was discovered and by whom, how it was taken from the Yosemite Indians, the coming of the miners, and much about gold mining, are all incorporated in the tale.

**MARCIA OF THE LITTLE HOME.** By Emily Calvin Blake. \$1.25. D. Appleton & Co.

Marcia, little mother to a large and poverty stricken family, is a creature to capture hearts and to hold them. Her childish loveliness, her cheery disposition, her lovely manners and original

methods keep her family out of gloom and the reader in constant amusement.

**THE STROKE OAR.** By Ralph D. Falne. 245 Pp. \$1.50. Charles Scribner's Sons.

The stroke of the "varsity" crew shambled in the middle of the college year through an accident, goes through some remarkable and highly entertaining adventures on board a filibustering steamer and a sailing vessel that end with his rowing in the great boat race at New London. The hero is a first rate fellow, and his mistakes and his triumphs make a breezy and exciting story from start to finish.

**THE WRECKING MASTER.** By Ralph D. Falne. 185 Pp. \$1.25. Charles Scribner's Sons.

The two sons of rival wreckers, who are in a race to rescue a big steamer which has gone ashore in a peculiar manner on a Florida reef, have adventures as novel as they are exciting. There is a sharp contest of skill, courage, and stratagems, and thrilling fights with men and with storms.

**THE INDIAN BOOK.** By William John Hopkins. 229 Pp. \$1.25. Houghton Mifflin Company.

A collection of Indian stories that will be a delight to every healthy minded boy and girl. Mr. Hopkins has based his narrative mainly upon Catlin's great Indian book, but has retold them in his own charming and magnetic way. The book as a whole will give children a complete, picturesque, and at the same time true idea of the manners and customs of the American Indian.

**FRUE'S PHRY TIMES.** By Amy Brooks. 255 Pp. H. Lothrop, Lee & Shepard Co.

This is the fourth volume of "Frue books," and in this book is the center of a group of very lively children, and the fun element is constant, both at home and on Frue's memorable visit to Boston with her dear older sister, Randy, the heroine of Miss Broder's popular "Randy Books."

**HAPPY CHILDREN.** By Ella Farnam Pratt. 187 Pp. \$1. Thomas Y. Crowell Company.

Eight little short stories telling of Elsie and her "surprise" Christmas, of the "Doll's Sister" and the amusing and amazing things which happened to her, of Gretchen Hall and how she took a nestful of birds to church one Sunday, of the picnic of the Kit-Cat Class, of the

Big Wild-Flower Club and the Little Wild-Flower Club, and other entertaining matters of interest to youngsters of tender years.

**THE UNMANNERLY TIGER AND OTHER KOREAN TALES.** By William Elliott Griffith. 135 Pp. H. Thomas Y. Crowell Company.

How many of us ever heard before of Tokgabi, the house brownie, and his wonderful pranks? Or of the impolite tiger, who gives his name to the book, and his dealings with the holy man? Or of magpies who build bridges, or of the rabbit who outwitted the tiger and the terranin? The tales of these creatures are curious enough, but even more interesting and amusing are the love affairs of the earthworm, Mr. Wum, and his bride Miss Thousand Legs; of Miss Mole, whom Daddy Mole wishes to mate with the Sun; and of the frog who married the most beautiful girl in Korea.

**HELEN GRANT'S HARVEST YEAR.** By Amanda M. Douglas. 412 Pp. \$1.25. Lothrop, Lee & Shepard Co.

Ninth volume of "Helen Grant's books." This volume sees the realization of Helen's promised trip abroad, taken under very pleasant circumstances. She returns to her duties as teacher to reap the rich results of devoted work for others. With her usual fitness for a "career" she finds it a hard problem to surrender to a possibly humble domestic sphere with the young clergyman, to whom she has pledged herself, but in the end his manliness wins and doubts are forever dispelled.

## Swedish Singing Society Commemorates Death of Gustavus II



A festival in commemoration of the death of Gustavus Adolphus II of Sweden, who fell in the battle of Lutzen, November 6, 1632, during the progress of the thirty years of war with Germany, was conducted Thursday evening in Washington hall by the Norden Singing society and the Viking Military band.

A feature of the evening's entertainment was a series of three tableaux songs, acted and sung by thirty members of the society. One tableaux was a scene in a German village, where an evening sentry paced back and forth before an emplacement. In another scene the king addresses his soldiers and offers a prayer. The last scene was entitled "The King of Sweden is Dead."

An address was delivered by Emil Muerling, editor of the Posten, on the life of the Swedish king, and a violin solo was played by Prof. Frank Mach. Following the program there was a reception, at which coffee was served.
