Other sports to considerable extent have this effect; but, according to Coach Stiehm, there is no game or sport that is so powerful and efficient a factor in the making of a college youth into a successful business or professional man.

Admitting foot ball is a rough game, Coach Stiehm said its rough and tumble qualities appeal to the sturdy manliness of the youth and the idea of hard knocks and bruises appeals to the best in boys. As proof of this he quoted no less a person than Theodore Roosevelt to the effect that a broken leg or arm or collarbone should be considered of no consequence when strength and physical prowess are to be conserved.

Walton with Couch Stiehm. Mr. Walton formally discussed Coach Stiehm's paper, approving his remarks and to some extent elaborating upon them. He favored strict study qualifications for foot ball athletes and said teachers should insist that boys play no foot ball unless they are up in their studies and should not sacrifice the school standards for the sake of winning games. Prof. Fisher in his opening remarks apologized for what he was about to say, remarking that he was about to express an unpopular thought.

"I think we are laying too much stress upon the physical education of our boys and girls. I believe they should be educated physically, but I do not believe we should allow the tide of physical, hero worship to carry us along with it., We are permitting ourselves too much to be the creatures of a mania over foot ball and athletic sports when we should be governing it and keeping it in its normal place. We are catering to and fostering the tendency to let such things as this force into the background the higher and finer and nobler things of life, the things of life that really are important. I believe in physical culture, but when you tell me that foot ball is wonderful in its effects of inspiring boys with all the manly virtues. I believe you must be wrong. I don't see where it gives them moral strength. They run around the streets yelling idiotic yells, their supporters with them, totally dicarding and ignoring other people. I don't see how that is building character, creating moral courage, fitting them for life's battle.

"You speak of the school spirit and the applause of the rooters. It siways has been my idea that gormal comage is displayed when one stands alone and fights, perhaps a losing fight, with no one to help and no one to applarde and cheer. What kind of courage is it that is inspired by a lot of people standing behind to back one up and cheer and drive him on?

For Physical Culture. "As I say, I believe in physical culture. but I don't believe in carrying athletic sport to the point where sight is lost of the finer and more important purposes of our educational institutions Speaking of the hard knocks and broken arms and collar cones, I don't believe and I think I never shall believe that God ever made the human body to be subjected to the strains of a foot ball

Prof. Teach endorsed frof. Fisher's renarks, praising for having the courage to take an attitude that he supposed was an unpopular one. He said he liked foot ball if it were the right kind of foot ball and wanted it in his school; but he did not want the kind of foot ball that most foot half is. He deplored the exaggeration of the importance of game and the rowdylem that it so frequently breeds. "I like friendly revalry; he said, "but I don't want the rivalry I have seen too often. I want a fraternalism and a game that is clean.

"When I took my boys to a neighborng town to play and we won the game we were practically mobbed. Bricks were brown at us and the ribs of one of my oys were broken. That is one kind of school spirit' I suppose, but we ought to work for the elimination of all school

spirit of that wort." Shell Denounces Rugby. President Shell denounced rugby foot sall, urging the adoption of soccor association foot ball. He said that his college has not suffered, but has gained by the substitution for rugby of soccor. which possesses all the advantages of rugby, but lacks its brutalising and dungerous qualities. He said there is no use denying that ordinary foot ball is too dangerous and should not be played. that deaths and injuries from its playing are altogether too common
