# NEBRASKA WALKS ALL OVER KANSAS

Cornhusker Warriors Lower Jayhawker Colors and Triumph Easily, 29 to 0.

WALKAWAY FROM THE START. Scores Come Early and Pile Up Fast During Contest.

KANSAS UNABLE TO RESIST Impossible for Them to Stand Up

Under Fierce Charges. O. FRANK IN STELLAR ROLE

Splendid Interference and Team Work Par Excellence on Part of Nebenska Gives Them Right to Valley Honors.

LAWRENCE, Kan., (Special Telegram.) -Nebraska today gave its oldest and most honorable rival, the University of Kansas, the worst defeat that any Jaybawker eleven has suffered during the last ten years. The score of 29 to 0 shows only how effectively the Cornhuskers played. The game will go down in Cornhusker foot bett annals as the cleanest cut victory of such proportions that has ever been achieved against the men of the Jayhawker school.

It was not luck that won for Nebraska. was superlor foot fall, every inch superior. Kansas was outplayed from whistle to whistle. Captain Howe of Yale made a goal from the field and the final score stood 6 to 3 in Princeton's favor. In rushing Yale outplayed the Tigers, but poor backfield work by the blue and white seemed to be lack of good generalship, which failed to keep the blue machine going down the

Foot ball banners of Princeton flaunted defiance at Yale in New Haven today, but with a southeast rain storm aweeping over the playing field both banners seemed to be dispirited over the prospects of a good foot ball test.

Foot ball enthusiasts dislike to play a three-cornered game in which the weather has a hand. The element of luck has usually figured much larger in such contests than under dry conditions. Princeton looked on such an element with more complacency than Yale because good fortune has walked hand in hand with the former in every game so far

this season. Out on Derby downs, where the amphitheater stands, the storm howied and thrashed all the forenoon tearing down small trees, putting telegraph wires out of commission and carrying off nearly everything that was not nailed down.
