

AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Postmaster Etter Shows Prosperous Condition of His Office.

COUNCILMEN TALK OF REPORT

Some Hesitancy About Installing New System at Considerable Expense—Charter Change on Police Judge.

Postmaster Lewis F. Etter in a review of the postoffice work during the past year shows that the wage earners of South Omaha bestow much patronage on the money order department of the local postoffice. The stamps and money order sales of the local office indicate an increase during the last year and it is estimated that the new year will be even an improvement over the last twelve months.

It is hoped moreover that this year will bring the long expected savings department to the local office. Already the department at Washington has requested and been furnished with information bearing on the savings bank question.

Among many business men it is expected that the savings department will do much for the city and for the poorer class of people, who for one reason or another will not patronize a bank. An additional benefit of the savings department of the postoffice is that women may deposit their savings with Uncle Sam and be certain that their hard earned pennies will not be subject to the demand of a wife and her husband.

The following are some of the figures offered by Postmaster Etter during the year the sales were as follows: Stamps and stamps envelopes, \$173,638.07; U. S. domestic money orders, 153,108.75; U. S. international money orders, 105,027.28; U. S. domestic money orders, 1,946.41; paid, 97,224.72; U. S. international money order, 6,384.00.

Considerable interest is manifested as to what position the city council will take in following out the recommendations of the special auditor who in an exhaustive report has pointed out several items that call for immediate and drastic attention.

Another matter that will claim the attention of the council will be the case of the police judge, whose accounts show a discrepancy for the second time during his incumbency in office. Some time ago when Auditor Ruffles mentioned the chaotic condition of the police court books, Councilmen Walters and Miller requested him to put the matter in writing.

Yesterday it appeared that certain provisions by which the council was empowered to discipline a delinquent official had been eliminated from the city charter in its recent revision under house rule 11 and senate rule 22. Beginning with section 3278 three sections of the old charter were eliminated.

It was said by some of the men at the yards yesterday that the fatality among hogs in transit would be lessened if the shippers would provide a deep bed of straw and some cross pens in the cars. Shipping in box cars was resorted to with poor success during the last week.

Other plants claim that while they have enough coal they will be glad to see a clear line of traffic established from the mines. Plenty of coal is to be had at the mines, where both the packers and coal dealers have large consignments ready to be shipped. On account of the bad condition of the weather the railroads have not been able to get the coal to the city.
