of Executive Council-Nebraska Divided Into Two Circuits for Collegians.

LINCOLN, Jan. II. Special Telegran Omaha university and Bellevue were let off easy at the meeting of the Nebraska State Intercollegiate conference at the Lincoln hotel Saturday when the matter of these two schools continuing athletic relations with Creighton university was considered. The board decided that the rules permitted the playing of teams out-side the conference, the only restriction being that permission should be secured from the executive council.

The state was divided into two circuits the eastern and western in order to facili-tate the work of deciding the championship. The eastern circuit includes Wes-leyan, Dosne, Peru Cotner and Bellevue, while the western includes Central City, Kearney, York and Hastings.
