RAILROAD COAL BINS RAIDED

Twenty-Four Youngsters Are Under Arrest for Stealing.

CASES WILL BE INVESTIGATED

Belief is that Children Are Taught by Parents to Carry Fuel Away from Railroad Yards and Storehouses.

Twenty-four children have been arrested for carrying coal from the Union Pacific yards and storehouses. They are in charge of juvenile court officers, who will not only attempt to discipline them, but will investigate the causes for such an unprecedented number of raids on the coal bins.

Mary Bernstein, probation officer, thinks that in some instances the children are instructed by their parents to steal coal. In case this is proven before the juvenile court action will be started against the parents, or if it is shown

that they are in straitened circumstances provision will be made to supply them with fuel.

Judge Kennedy of the juvenile court is in Louisville attending the national child labor conference. For this reason no cases were tried today, about thirty being postponed until next Saturday.

JANAPOULAS IS FINED FOR CONTEMPT OF COURT

John Janapoulos was fined \$5 and costs in police court by Judge Foster for contempt of court. Janapoulos is alleged to have gotten George Dionee, one of his countrymen, out of the city in order that he would not appear against him.

Janapoulos is alleged to have assaulted Dionee three weeks ago. Dionee filed a complaint against Janapoulos charging him with assault with intent to kill.

Janapoulos under some pretense or other got Dionee to go to Kansas City and when the case was brought up in court it was continued for a week. When it was called this morning and the complaining witness did not appear City Prosecutor

Dickinson filed a complaint charging Janapoulos with contempt of court and he was arraigned immediately.

Midway Jointists to Be Tried Again

Billy Crutcheff and Jack Broomfield, the negro proprietors of the Midway, are to be tried again on the charge of selling liquor in violation of the law. Twice their case has been held in police court and in both instances the juries disagreed.

Judge Foster has fixed Friday, February 2, as the date of the trial, and on the previous day the jury will be selected. Counsel for the defense tried to put the trial off for two weeks, but Judge Foster refused to grant so much grace.

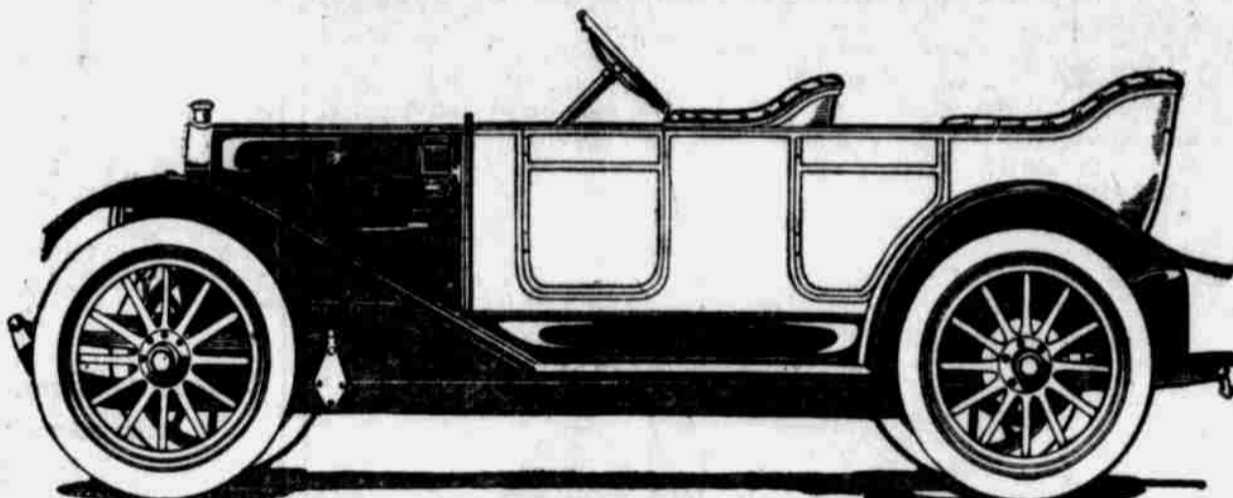
