## DEALERS REFUSE TO PAY TAX

Smaller Coal Men Decline to Settle on Occupation.

NO EFFORT MADE TO COLLECT

Larger Firms Are Paying Up Without Any Protest—Names Given Into Hands of the Prosecuting Attorney.

Threats of long legal fights against the city by a temporary organization of smaller coal dealers has resulted in a suspension of all moves toward collecting occupation taxes from coal dealers.

Larger dealers are paying without protest, but unless the occupation taxes are generally paid the funds of the weights and measures department will be much depleted.

Several thousand dollars are involved in the disagreement, which is between a few large dealers on the one side and more than 100 smaller dealers on the other. Objection is made to the ordinance under which the occupation tax is collected, attorneys having been retained by the temporary organization to contest its enforcement.

Names of dealers who have refused to pay their occupation taxes have been placed in the hands of the prosecuting attorney, but none of the dealers have been approached. Reports that a few of the smaller dealers have decided to pay their taxes rather than stand the expenses of extended litigation is strenuously denied at organization headquarters.

Smaller dealers are fighting for a graduated occupation tax, compelling large dealers to pay more. On the other side, the large dealers are making no move to interfere with the due process of law and have been eager to pay their occupation taxes. The validity of the ordinance under which these taxes are collected has been questioned repeatedly and evidence is being gathered by the attorneys for the smaller dealers to show that either its passage was not formal or the ordinance in itself is not legal.

## CORN RECEIPTS SHOW GAIN FOR FEBRUARY

Receipts of grain at Omaha in January fell 800,000 bushels short of January receipts last year, which were 4,800,000 bushels. There was a gain of 700,000 bushels in corn receipts, but a loss in other grains.
