WILL CLEAN UP THE HOSPITAL

Expenditures for Clothing, Bedding and Utensils Authorized.

USING OLD CANS FOR CUPS

Many of the Old Men Have Been Existing Without a Change of Shirts—Will Spend Seven Thousand Dollars.

First steps towards cleaning out the county hospital and getting it into more humanly habitable condition were taken by the Board of County Commissioners in committee of the whole Tuesday, when Commissioner Frank C. Best, chairman of the county hospital committee, was authorized to buy shirts and underwear for the patients and many inmates who are insufficiently clothed, bedding to replace what is filthy or worn out, and dishes to replace those that have been broken and have disappeared.

For these items Mr. Best will expend between \$500 and \$700. This done, the commissioners will make improvements which will make the hospital a more fit place for the sick and the poor to call home. About \$7,000 altogether may be expended.

Mr. Best told the board that many of the hospital inmates have been drinking coffee out of old tomato cans, improved into drinking cups, and later using the same receptacles for cupboards. Many, he said, are wearing shirts that are rotted out and have no other shirts to put on. In one ward there are about forty male patients and the ward is voice about fifty shirts.

Stock Winters in the West Better Than Expected

John H. Orr, a cattleman of Lewellen, Neb., declared while in Omaha that ranchmen and cattlemen had not suffered this winter as much as had been reported. "In western Nebraska," said Mr. Orr, "we have been able to secure hay at from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per ton. The winter has been rather severe, but no great losses have resulted."

Mr. Orr is visiting for a brief time in the city with Mayor Dahlman, with whom he used to cavort about camp fires on the range. J. A. Morley, a ranchman of Casper, Wyo., and a former pal of Mr. Orr is also visiting the mayor.

HOTEL KEEPERS HELD FOR ASSAULTING GIRL

The police have arrested Chris Papp and Anton Laves, Greek proprietors of the Athens hotel, at 321 South Thirtieth street, charged with assault upon 17-year old Linda Nelson of Mead, Neb. The girl appeared before Captain Dempsey this morning and said that last night she had gone to the hotel to get some clothing that belonged to her sister, who formerly worked there. As soon as she made known the purpose of her visit she says she was seized by the Greeks and dragged into a room and assaulted. She says her screams brought Florence Wilcox, a roomer at the Athens, to her rescue and she aided her to escape from the place. She went to the police station with the girl and swore out a warrant for the arrest of the hotel proprietors and they were taken shortly afterwards. The police took the prisoners and the girl before the grand jury and she will tell them her story.

'POSSUM DINNER TO BE GIVEN BY AL DRESHER

Woodmen Insurgers Get Many Letters in Support of the Move

Prof. Nathan Bernstein, who with several other younger members of the Modern Woodmen of America, is leading the insurgent movement against the enforcement of the rulings passed by head camp officers in Chicago recently, has called for a meeting to organize. This meeting will be held at Woodmen hall, the Continental block, one week from Wednesday. "Six million people are involved," said Mr. Bernstein, "and we're going to fight the new rules on a national basis. There is talk of secession, but we are not fighting for that. We're fighting for justice. Letters are pouring in upon me from every part of Nebraska and Missouri pledging support and urging the fight to continue. These letters breathe defiance and even make charges against the head officers, but we are not now considering these charges."

"Our plan is to get an initial organization, make it state-wide, and then nationwide. That we have sympathy these letters prove. They come from bankers, clerks of camps, doctors, lawyers and business men. One letter says: 'Fight! Fight! Fight! Twenty-four years I've been a Modern Woodman. I helped build the order. Now, when old age comes they want to squeeze us out. I don't need the insurance, but many poor men do. Fight!'"

"A letter from Hopkins, Mo., pledges the support of the Modern Woodmen of America of that place. 'We have been reading in The Bee,' it says, 'and we have watched what you were doing. We are with you.' The writer says an entire camp of 120 members will be forced to withdraw if the rulings go into effect."

Ak-Sar-Ben Dance is Not Turkey Trot

The board of governors of Ak-Sar-Ben attended the rehearsal of "The Jolly Musketeers" Monday night and placed its official "O. K." upon the dance done by Oscar Lieben and a young woman of the cast.
