W. A. Rourke, owner of the Omaha base ball team, returned yesterday from Chicago, where he had been attending the schedule meeting of the Western league clubs. He reports everybody satisfied with the schedule and eager for the opening of the season. He said most of the magnates came to the meeting determined to have a 154 game schedule, but when the 160 game idea was explained to them with the three-trip plan they all voted in favor of the latter.

"Harmony" was the keynote of the whole meeting, said Rourke, and the Wichita contingent was highly enthusiastic. He reported Doc Moines to be in great shape and everything in the league is all floor. While in the big city he said "Goat" Anderson to "Goat" himself, who purchased a half interest in the Wheeling (Pa.) club of the Central league. Anderson also purchased Sam Agnew from Pa. and will make the Omaha youngster his regular catcher this season. "Goat" is president and manager of the Wheeling club and says the club is in good standing and hoped to be the pennant winner for 1912. He says the club is a money-maker and he expects to have a good season.

Anderson played right field for the Omaha club the early part of last season and was sold for the season to Doc Moines, where he distinguished himself for his all-around playing. He was a fast base runner and a good man with the stick. He will take complete charge of the Wheeling team.

Iowa Co-Eds Must Take Gym Work

IOWA CITY, Ia., Feb. 3.—(Special).—The curriculum of the University of Iowa with the beginning of the second semester of the current school year took up in earnest the physical development of the school's 1,300 girls. Semi-compulsory athletic for co-eds have been instituted here and the following courses arranged therein: First, theory and practice of physical education, a course for those girls who intend to teach gymnastics work; second, indoor base ball, which is to be started with the end of the football season; third, heavy apparatus work, given under the direction of Assistant Instructor Grace Roe; fourth, folk dances, planned as one of the most delightful departments of the work; fifth, organized games, designed as special instruction for open air and outdoor work. This is the first time that Iowa university has assumed such particular care to girls' physical training. The department has been placed in charge of Miss Alice Wilkinson, formerly of Chicago.

President Ryan Asks for \$7,000 a Month

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 3.—Arrests of the forty or more persons indicted in the alleged dynamite conspiracy will be arranged to take place simultaneously not earlier than next Monday, it was said here today.

United States District Attorney Charles W. Miller said the government hoped to have in custody all the men by the time the arrest of any one of them had become known. This is to prevent the disclosure of the defendants' identities by the arrest of one man, who could demand a copy of his indictment involving others. The fact that several of those indicted live on the Pacific coast makes Monday the probable date of service.

That reports had been received by the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers that thirty or more of their International and local officers were to be indicted was asserted by Frank M. Ryan, the president, in his monthly report issued to the 15,000 members today. Mr. Ryan said:

"It is reported here that thirty or more of our officers, local as well as international, are to be indicted. Don't be alarmed about indictments or a few leaders going to jail."

Mr. Ryan refused to make any other comment. His report also called upon the members to support a special fund of \$7,000 a month. The report was issued from the headquarters where J. J. McNamara, the convicted secretary-treasurer of the organization, was arrested last April.
