

HOG RECORD SMASHED AGAIN

Week Just Ending Shows Heaviest Receipts in Yards' History.

DUE TO HIGH PRICE OF FEED

Most of Squealers Coming In Now Average About 200 Pounds in Weight, Placing Premium on Heavy Porkers.

Record-smashing in hog receipts in the South Omaha market is becoming a popular pastime. During the week just ended more porkers were received than during any other like period in the history of the market.

The hogs are mostly of the light size, weighing around 200 pounds, and bringing from \$5.00 to \$5.25. The top hogs at this time are the heavy fellows, on account of their scarcity.

The heavy receipts are largely due to the high price of feed, the raisers realizing that they can get bigger returns from the porkers in their present development than by holding them longer on high feed until they make the heavyweight class.

A pleasing feature of the heavy market is the fact that Omaha is paying higher prices than Chicago. The Omaha quotation was \$6.37 1/2 against Chicago, \$6.25.

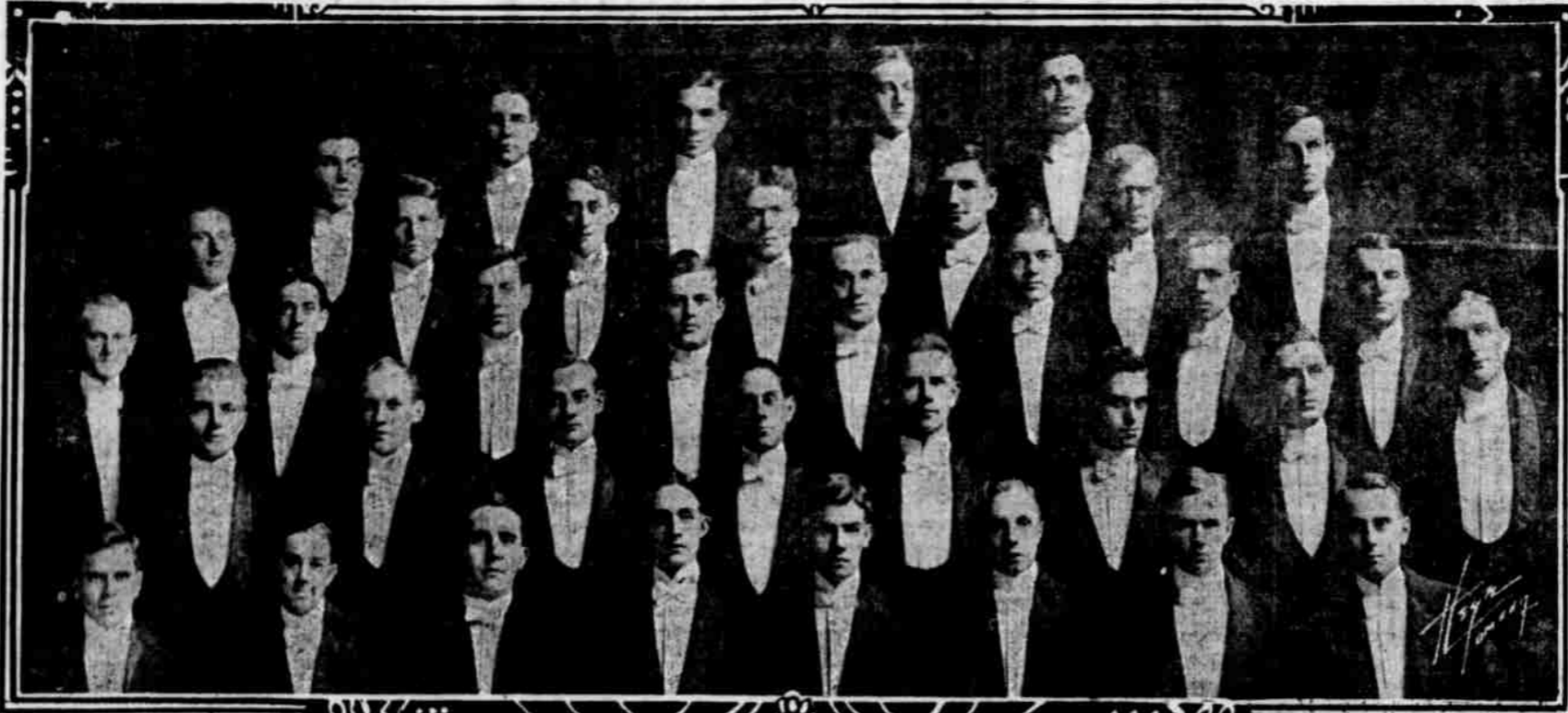
