GREEKS FOILED BY MATRON

Mrs. Gibbons is Rushed When She Takes Ruth Faron to Train.

ATTEMPT TO KIDNAP THE GIRL

Gang Waits at Depot and It Was Necessary for the Matron to Hold Greeks at Bay Till Policeman Arrives.

A gang of Greeks interfered with an attempt to get Ruth Faron, the 17-year-old Danville girl, out of Omaha on a 6 o'clock train Monday night. Half a dozen Greeks accosted Matron Gibbons at the Union depot and sought to take the girl away from her, but with a revolver in hand Mrs. Gibbons held the Greeks at bay until Officer Cunningham arrived. The girl was taken back to the city jail and later was sent out of town to Chicago on the midnight Rock Island train.

Ruth Faron was arrested last Thursday in company with Joe Poalis for being an inmate of a disorderly house, a Greek joint at 143 Jackson street. Poalis was fined \$5 and costs and the girl was kept by the matron until her age was learned. It was proven that she is 18 years old and it was decided to send her back to her home in Danville. Her sister, Mrs. M. M. Glass provided the money for transportation.

Health Office to Insist on Reports

Henry All Over.

Reserve Bank Will Not Be Central Bank, Says R. W. Bonyng

"The proposed National Reserve association would not be a central bank," said R. W. Bonyng, of the National Monetary commission in an address to business men at the Commercial club Tuesday. "It would not do a banking business. It would not do business with individuals. It would not be in competition with existing banks. It would be only what its name implies, a union of the 2,000 national banks of the country."

Mr. Bonyng explained the organization as outlined in the bill recommended by the commission, the manner of electing directors of the association and their powers. He said the present monetary system of the country is cursed by seventeen defects of which he mentioned three: First, an antiquated system of reserves, scattering the reserves among thousands of units, making them ineffective for use in great emergency and causing them to gravitate to New York, encouraging speculation. Second, failure to provide legal methods whereby banks can cooperate for the utilization of the banking resources of the nation, which are 40 per cent of the banking resources of the world, but not great enough to prevent America from calling on the Bank of England during the panic of 1907.

EVANGELIST SPEAKS ABOUT JAILS IN RUSSIA

Evangelist A. C. Daniels of Washington, D. C., president of the general conference of the Seventh Day Adventists, delivered a lecture upon prison conditions in Russia last night at the Adventist church, Twenty-fifth and Indiana streets. During the last year Evangelist Daniels has traveled over 4,000 miles. Russia was the last place he visited and he says that conditions there are the most horrible that he has ever seen. He says there are hundreds of missionaries of all denominations being kept in jail there for no other reason than that of preaching the gospel.

RECORD RUN OF HOGS MADE

Thirty Thousand Porkers Arrive at South Omaha Market.

PRICE SAME AS IN CHICAGO

Result is that Many Iowa Hog Raisers Are Deserting That Market to Save the Difference in Transportation Cost.

With market conditions ideal another record run of hogs was made at the South Omaha yards yesterday. At noon an estimate of 30,000 head was made, this being more than 4,000 above the record of January 23, when 25,600 porkers arrived. Tuesday's receipts were the largest for any one day in the history of the yards, and almost equal the Chicago receipts, which are 21,000 head. Omaha prices yesterday were the same as paid in Chicago and the result is that the Iowa farmers are deserting the Chicago market. By so doing they save the amount necessary to haul their hogs to that place.

Car Splits Switch and Blocks Three Street Car Lines

A Hansom Park car split the switch, yesterday morning about 5, at Twenty-fourth and Cumine street and blocked all traffic on the Park, Walnut Hill and Cross Town lines for over half an hour, making many late to their work and forcing many to walk down town. The front trucks on a north bound park car turned the corner at Twenty-fourth and Cumine streets all right, but the rear trucks started for Walnut Hill, with the result that the car was so tightly wedged that half an hour was required to extricate it. Snow in the switch caused the split.

HEAVY SNOW OVER STATE

From Mississippi River to Mountains is a New White Blanket. DEEPEST SNOW OF THE WINTER

Railroads Report Heavy Fall Over the Entire Grain Belt, Including Northern Kansas and South Dakota. Reports received at the railroad offices and sent by the agents at the stations along the lines centering in Omaha, indicate that a snow, the most general in years, and the heaviest of the winter, fell Monday night and at almost every point, continued yesterday.

According to railroad advices, the blanket of snow that ranges from two to eighteen inches in depth, covers every portion of Nebraska and Iowa; at least the north of Kansas, the east half of Colorado and Wyoming and the south half of South Dakota, from the Big Sioux river to the Black Hills.

Up and down the Missouri river, from Atchison, Kan., to Sioux City, when the morning reports to the Northwestern and the Missouri Pacific was received, the snow ranged from four to eight inches in depth, about the least being recorded at Omaha. On the Northwestern's Wyoming and Black Hills lines, the snowfall during the night was from four to seven inches, all the way from Lander, east, reaching a depth of ten inches between Long Pine and Norfolk. And it was still snowing.

The Burlington reports showed snow everywhere except in the vicinity of Sheridan, in the live stock country. There dry and warm weather is what is wanted and they are getting it.
