STATE FORCES OUSTER CASE

Attorney General Files Motion in South Omaha Controversy.

SEEKS TO HAVE REFEREE NAMED

Application Intended to Force the Accused Commissioners of Manic City to Take Some Action Other Than for Delay.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 16.—(Special Telegram)—Attorney General Martin this afternoon filed an alternative motion in the supreme court in the case of the state against John J. Ryan and Joseph Pivonka, police commissioners of South Omaha. One section of the motion asks the court to render judgment of ouster as prayed for in his petition of the state for the reason that the defendant is in default of answer and that the time appointed by law in which to make answer has expired. If the court does not wish to pass judgment without first hearing the evidence the motion asks that a referee be appointed to take testimony and report his findings to the court.

The information under his Sackett law was filed October 6, 1911, and to this the defendants demurred. The court overruled the demurrer February 9 of this year. The real intent of the motion filed today is to force the question to an issue and not permit it to be dormant on the calendar. Whether the defendants will file an answer or adopt some other procedure to delay the actual hearing is not known here.

SEED CORN TESTS VARIABLE

State Chemist Finds Some Patent Incubators to Be Faulty.

"RAG BABY" IS ONE SURE DEVICE

Adjutant General Phelps Gets Word Maneuver Plans for Nebraska Have Been Changed to Ft. Riley from Ft. Russell.

LINCOLN, Feb. 16.—(Special.)—If experiments in the pure food department are any guide the "rag baby" is a better tester of seed corn than the patent incubators constructed for that purpose. It takes longer of course to make the test with the "baby" and it is a little more trouble. Chemist Redfern has taken seed from the same ears and put them in both apparatuses. From lot of twenty-three ears the patent tester showed thirteen which failed to germinate at all and two more which were too weak to be of any value as seed. If the results obtained are to be relied on. Samples from the same ears put into the "rag baby" gave the following results: Only four ears failed to germinate at all and two were too weak to be of any value. All the others showed vigorous top and root sprouts. These sample ears came from Lancaster county.

Another sample of white corn, which came from Creighton was put into the patent tester. Mr. Redfern does not know how many ears the kernels came from, as it was sent to him shelled and contained in a sack. Out of 100 kernels tested only twenty-five germinated strong enough to be of value as seed. Mr. Redfern has just put a lot more corn into the tester, but it has not been in long enough to tell what its value is.

Dorchester Has \$2,500 Fire.

DORCHESTER, Neb., Feb. 16.—(Special.)—The livery barn owned by D. C.
