

HULL'S CASE GETS IN COURT

Motion is Made to Have Evidence Taken by Depositions.

MANDAMUS ACTION IS FILED

Attorney for Mrs. McKee Asks that Hull be Compelled to Drop the Fight for Depositions and to Argue Case.

Motion to have the court sit as a nory and take the evidence in C. W. Hull's suit to annul his alimony contract with his former wife, Mrs. W. R. McKee, in the form of depositions instead of in open court was filed before Judge Troup, to whom the case has been assigned. The motion was made on the ground that witnesses for Hull are almost certain to leave the city, get beyond the jurisdiction of the court in order to escape going on the witness stand to tell what they know of the relations of parties to the suit. If depositions are taken they can be taken at once without waiting for trial time.

Judge Troup indicated he doubted his power to take such action.

Local Officials Locate Painter

Credit for the arrest of Frank Painter, former official in the local union of the International Association of Structural Bridge and Iron Workers, who is wanted for complicity in dynamite outrages, goes entirely to United States Marshal William P. Warner and Deputies Haze, Nickerson and McCullom. Marshal Warner secured information the day after Painter left Omaha to the effect that he had shipped a large box of personal effects to Prairie City, Ill. over the Burlington, and they traced Painter there, but because of lack of jurisdiction they were forced to notify the Department of Justice at Washington. Several days before Painter's disappearance a man, named Cox, whom Marshal Haze afterward found out was Painter's father-in-law, visited him and disappeared with the union leader.

The officials here believe that Painter had suspected for weeks that he was to be indicted and that he had been contemplating making himself scarce before the indictment was actually found.

COURT HOUSE SQUABBLE UP

Commissioners Meet in Secret Session to Discuss Issues.

NO REPLIES ARE RECEIVED

Marble Does Not Arrive, Contractors and Bonding Company Fail to Respond and Commissioners Are Vexed.

Draught action of the Board of County Commissioners several weeks ago in practically calling upon the Fidelity and Deposit company of Maryland, bondsmen for Caldwell and Drake, county building general contractors, to make the contractors rush the completion of the building having failed to bring any results, the board went into secret conference with Architect John Latenser yesterday for the purpose of deciding what step now shall be taken.

Caldwell and Drake have not indicated by any action that they will rush the work. The marble shipments, which Caldwell and Drake and the Colorado Yule Marble company said would be sent at the rate of three carloads a week, have come at no such rate. The bonding company has made no reply whatever to the board's message to it.


