## Former Omaha Boy Makes Discoveries

Digest attention is paid to Prof. Stebbins and his astronomical observations of the "Demon Star" and its companion. Prof. Stebbins, an instructor in the University of Illinois, is a son of C. S. Stebbins of this city, and graduated from the Omaha High school. Speaking of new discoveries about the "Demon Star" the Literary Digest says:
"The variable star Algol, sometimes

known as the "Demon," oscillates con-tinually between the second and the fourth magnitude, taking a few hours less than three days to make the change. This periodical alteration in brilliancy has been shown to be due to the fact that celestian bodies revolving in orbits about their common center of gravity. The change in brightness is explained by supposing one of the bodies to be brilliant and the other dark, so that when the second passes between us and the other. comes an American astronomer, Prof. Stebbins, of the University of Illinois, who shows that the "companion" of Algoi, far from being dark, shines with over five times the brightness of our own sun.
