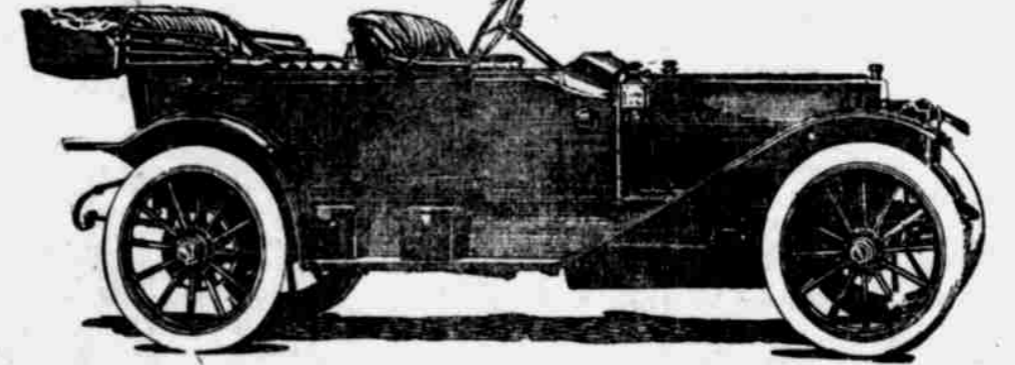

PRICE AND QUALITY WELL MAINTAINED IN HOG MARKET. CINCINNATI, O., Feb. 22.—(Special Telegram.)—Price Current says the supply of hogs for market is being well maintained, as also the quality of stock in arrivals. Total western slaughtering was 720,000 hogs, compared with 710,000 the preceding week and 665,000 two weeks ago. For a corresponding time last year the figure was 695,000 and two years ago 600,000. From November 1 the total was 11,465,000, against 11,000,000 a year ago, an increase of 2,535,000 hogs. Prominent prices compare as follows from November 1 to February 22:
