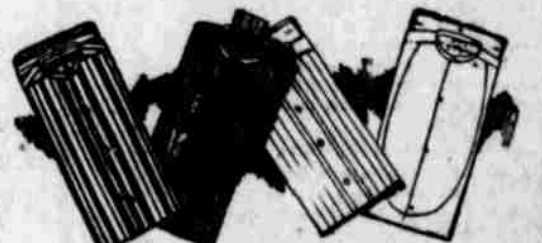

BALDRIGE QUITS COMMITTEE

Resigns from Executive Committee of Commercial Club.

WISHES TO RUN FOR CONGRESS

Old Bylaws of Club Do Not Permit It—Clause Did Not Appear in the New Rules as Recently Adopted.

H. H. Baldrige resigned from the executive committee of the Commercial club recently because he desires the republican nomination for congressman of this district and the club's bylaws forbid any member of the committee seeking political office. The rule which so provides, however, was omitted from the new set of rules presented to the executive committee last week by the bylaws committee. Mr. Baldrige, it is said, urged the committee to retain the old rule and accept his resignation. No action has yet been taken, either on the resignation or on the rule. The new bylaws were presented on February 20 and probably will be voted upon next Tuesday. What the new rules provide is not known to the general membership of the club, as the executive committee has sole jurisdiction in the matter. It is not known that they do not provide

GRAIN RECEIPTS DOUBLED

Omaha Shows Remarkable Increase Over February of Last Year.

BIG GAIN IS IN THE CORN MARKET

Every Class of Grain Except Barley Comes to This Market in Larger Quantities Than During Same Period Last Year.

Building Permits Show an Increase

February buildings permits surpassed in amount the records of any previous year for the same month. The total number of permits issued numbered 96, the value of the buildings constructed being \$113,195. For the same month in 1911 seventy permits were issued, the amount being \$97,200. In 1910 seventy-eight permits were issued, amounting to \$109,252. The permits for January this year fall below those issued in previous years for the same month.

MARRIES GIRL TO KEEP HER FROM BEHIND BARS

In order to avert a jail sentence on a charge of being an inmate of a disorderly house, Clyde Perrigo of Omaha and Little Miller of Holdrege, Neb., were married in police court yesterday by Judge Foster. The Miller girl was arrested in the raid on the Welcome hotel and carted to jail. Perrigo at the time of the arrest was up town, but true to the instincts of an ardent lover he followed his sweetheart into court, where he informed the judge that he would marry the girl if she was discharged. Foster told him to get a license and he would discharge her. Perrigo pulled the necessary paper from his pocket and the judge did the rest.

ERDMAN MAY BE RETURNED TO PRISON IN COLORADO

The warden of the state penitentiary at Lincoln has written to Sheriff McEhane, asking him to come and take away Frank Erdman, in whose case the supreme court has ordered a new trial. The warden wants him taken back to the Douglas county jail. McEhane says he will not deliver the man to Douglas county, since a new trial has been ordered. The warden still holds a warrant for Erdman's arrest as a fugitive from justice. The warrant is from the Colorado state penitentiary at Canon City, Colorado, which Erdman escaped after he had only partially served a term for burglary. Erdman may be released and arrested on the warrant and taken back to Colorado.

FELLMAN ASKS CHANGE OF VENUE IN LIBEL SUIT

Rev. E. F. Fellman, pastor of the Grace Baptist church, who with the Omaha Daily News is defendant against Judge Lee S. Estelle's \$20,000 libel damage suit in district court, has filed a motion for a change of venue to some other district court in Nebraska. Fellman asserts he could not get a fair trial in the Douglas county district court.

Seed Corn Gospel Disperses Enmity

"The seed corn campaign of Omaha's publicity bureau has done more in two months to awaken a friendly feeling for Omaha among the people of the state than all other influences for the last twenty years," said Prof. E. W. Hunt of Syracuse, Neb., who is in Omaha today. "In the last three years there has been an almost complete revolution of feeling for Omaha, and especially since the seed corn campaign started. 'Formerly the people were suspicious of anything that originated in Omaha, thinking it started for the private benefit of the Omaha business men, but now they realize that Omahans are willing to go down into their pockets and do things for the state as a whole, without thought of direct benefit.' Prof. Hunt, formerly professor of English in the University of Nebraska, is a prosperous farmer near Syracuse. CAKE OF DYNAMITE UNCOVERED IN PIERRE

PIERRE, S. D., March 1.—(Special.)—A workman who was grading yesterday near the site of the Betts grading camp at the time they did a lot of railway grading in this city five years ago this winter struck his pick into a pile of pasteboard tubes and was kicking them around to try to find out what they were, when another man who knew came into sight and began to beg the man with the pick to desist, and at the same time getting farther and farther away. An investigation showed that the pick had cut into a cache of 300 sticks of dynamite, which had evidently been buried by the grading crew for safe keeping and forgotten when they left. The plant was within less than two blocks of the state house, and if the dynamite had not been frozen there would have been a shaking up which would have roused the town.
