Gravity of Situation in Southern Republic Causes President to Issue Proclamation. CONSULS TO CARE FOR EFFECTS. Decision Reached After Special Meeting of the Cabinet. MUST AVOID ANY PARTISANSHIP. Utterance is Not Recognition of Revolutionary Movement. SEEKS TO AVOID INTERVENTION. American Citizens Told to Refrain from Crossing Line. STATUTES MUST BE OBSERVED. FOREIGN TROOPS AGAIN ON THE WAY TO PEKING

Council of Ministers Sends Out Call for All Available Men in Adjacent Ports. THOUSAND WILL ARRIVE TODAY. Situation in the Capital of China Becomes Serious. MUTINEERS ATTACK PALACE. Portion of Residence of Father of Dowager Empress Burned. SHOPS LOOTED, HOUSES FIRED. Headless Bodies Lying in Streets of Many Parts of City. PAO TING FU IS ATTACKED. Troops Which Left Peking Thursday Burn Part of City and Kill Number of Roman Catholic Missionaries. PEKING, March 2.-A serious recurrence of disorder occurred today when a detachment of artillery headed by a band marched to the palace of Duke Kuei-Hsiang, father of the empress dowager, and shelled down the gate. They looted a large amount of property and burned a portion of the palace. Many missionaries have been slaughtered by the mutineers in Pao-Ting-Fu, according to a report received here today. It is thought probable, however, in well informed circles that only one or two have been killed. It is believed they are Roman Catholics. The foreign ministers here after a conference have decided to bring into Peking all the available foreign troops stationed in adjacent ports in China. A force of 1,000 of various nationalities will arrive here tomorrow. Although last night parties of soldiers belonging to the army commanded by Chiang Hual Chih were engaged themselves in looting today they fought the looters in the outskirts of the city. Prisoners they took were summarily decapitated and many headless bodies are lying in the streets in various parts of the city. In the distant part of the West City considerable trouble occurred. Whole streets of shops were looted and many houses were set on fire. The civilian population has armed and fortified private premises while barricades were erected in the streets for purposes of defense. Pa Ting Fu Looted. The mutineers who left Peking for Pao-Ting Fu yesterday and whom Yuan Shi Kai ordered to be arrested or killed by the garrison of that city have been joined by many of the soldiers there. They have looted a great part of Pao-Ting Fu and burned large areas of the city. Pang Tai, twenty-two miles from Peking, on the railroad to Tien Tsin was looted by another gang of mutineers today. British troops guarding the railroad there protected the women and children, but the mutineers burned the railway station and held up a train, robbing many of the Chinese passengers. Yung Ping Fu, where the American troops are guarding the railroad to Chin Wang Tsao, also was looted today. It is evident that all the soldiers of the northern Chinese army are in agreement in the pillaging movement. They are under the belief that the coming of the republican delegates from Nanking to Yuan Shi Kai means the dismissal of the northern troops from the service. The delegates telegraphed today to General Li Yuen Heng, commander of the republican troops at Nanking and vice president of the republic, to bring a republican army to Peking to restore order. Yuan Shi Kai today promised to pardon all returning mutineers, but has not yet received any response. The populace has been notified that all persons found in the streets tonight after 8 o'clock will be shot. The soldiers of the Imperial guard and those belonging to Chiang Huan Chih's army are now nominally in control of Peking. It remains to be seen whether they are much better than the mutineers. Situation at Szentow Serious. The situation at Szentow is becoming more serious every day. The interior of the province is in a state of complete anarchy. General Ling with 300 troops from Waichow has arrived in the city to suppress the disorders and another (Continued on Second Page.)

Bank Robber Slain By Posse of Police Near Montreal

MONTREAL, Canada, March 2.-One of five robbers who broke into a branch of the Royal bank early today at Montreal West, a junction of the Canadian Pacific railroad, five miles west of the city was killed in a running fight with citizens. Residents of the neighborhood got the alarm before the gang had obtained any loot. After an exchange of shots the other four robbers escaped leaving the body of their companion. The four burglars who got away possibly owe their escape to the fact that they were equipped with snow shoes and their pursuers were hindered by the deep snow. The dead man has not been identified. The attempted robbery was the most daring in the history of Canada. A railway watchman saw the men crawl through a window into the bank. He notified the police who surrounded the building. The bandits were called upon to surrender. Suddenly there was a terrific dynamite explosion and the bank was completely wrecked. In the confusion the robbers got away, but were cornered later in a shack in the outskirts of the city. The chief of police and his men entered the building and engaged in a duel with the men. One robber was killed outright and two more fell badly wounded, but later escaped with their companions. Charles Fitzpatrick, son of the chief of police, was seriously hurt.

Pastor Charged With Perjury and His Home Burned

FORT WORTH, Tex., March 2.-A few hours after Rev. J. Frank Norris, pastor of the First Baptist church, had been indicted on the charge of perjury, his home burned down last night. It came as a mysterious sequel to an equally mysterious chain of events in which the nation's fighting minister has figured. The most startling development came last night when accused of perjury, Norris was charged with having written letters to himself in which he was threatened with death if he did not leave town. Norris first attracted attention here by campaigns for enforcement of prohibition laws. Then Norris declared an attempt had been made to assassinate him. This was followed by the destruction of the First Baptist church by fire. Norris reported a second attempt had been made on his life after this, and he traveled with a bodyguard. Then he exhibited the warning letters which last night the grand jury declared Norris wrote to himself. Norris' charges attracted a great deal of attention to his church work.

Kimmel Case is Given to the Jury

ST. LOUIS, March 2.-The Kimmel mystery and insurance case went to the jury shortly before noon today after United States District Judge Charles F. Amshutz had delivered his instructions. One of the most important of the instructions was "that certain dearest in life" might so change a person that his friends of earlier days would not recognize him. This was a reference to the testimony that if the assassin, Andrew J. White is George A. Kimmel, he has undergone remarkable physical changes since his disappearance in 1886. The judge said the burden of the proof rested on the plaintiff, the receiver of a defunct bank of Niles, Mo., to show that Kimmel is dead.

Robber Shot After Looting Bank Says Comes from Bluffs

AURORA, Colo., March 2.-Still showing facial disfigurements received Thursday night in an attempted holdup of a postoffice here, Dwight Day of Council Bluffs, Ia., who registered as "Grotto Day, Cincinnati, O.," is in the county hospital preparing for the amputation of his left arm. His shoulder was shattered by a charge of shot received in escaping after successfully looting the Aurora State bank here this morning. He secured \$30, but this was recovered when he was arrested shortly after 9 o'clock Day stumbled into the cashier's case of the bank at Aurora where Assistant Cashier Walsh had just spread his cash and at the point of pistol compelled the cashier to hand over his revolver. He then filled his pockets and backing out, released the spring lock, imprisoning the cashier. He was pursued by a citizen into an abandoned powder mill where Day was shot in the arm. Here the police captured him.

Man Who Says He is Robbed of Big Sum

TAMPA, Fla., March 2.-Declaring he lost or had been robbed of \$50,000 which he had drawn from a bank in Savannah, Mo., J. E. Esamann, said to be a prominent merchant of that place, was found here today, dazed and apparently unable to recall what had happened to him. He says he started from his home to go to Fort Springs, Ark., and that he fell or was slugged in Kansas City and that he knows nothing of what happened since that time. Esamann was located by T. E. Bryan, a friend of the merchant's family. Esamann told his story in rambling words and little of a definite nature could be obtained from him. After his injury in Kansas City he says he remembers nothing clearly. He says in the hospital he associates with brutal treatment by someone he thinks was an attendant. He next recalls traveling, probably in a freight car, and being compelled to sign some kind of a paper by a person he cannot place.

Good Depth of Snow Over Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming and States East to the Mississippi River. A snowstorm covering the widest area of any that has visited the central west, was general yesterday from Minnesota and the Dakotas on the north to Oklahoma on the south and throughout Wyoming east to the lakes. Light snow began to fall before daylight in Omaha and during the day about four or five inches fell. The snow stopped late in the afternoon. Temperatures over the storm-stricken region range from zero in Wyoming to 20 to 25 degrees above zero. Across western Kansas, Nebraska and throughout Wyoming the snow is drifting, but not badly, in other localities there is so little wind that "calm" is reported.
