Mr. Hamilton also attended the state university, where he was a member of Delta Upsilon fraternity. All of his attendants will be "D. U.'s." The fraternity idea will be carried out in every way possible, and most of the younger guests will be Pi Beta Phi members of the state, and Delta U's.

Miss Fitzgerald's maid of honor will be Miss Ruth Fitzgerald, and her bridesmaids, Miss Helen Holloway of Minneapolis, Ia., both of whom are at the state university, and Miss Lucille Bell of York and Miss Ruth Heacock of Falls City, both of whom are in college at Ames. Miss Grace Salisbury of Lincoln will be mistress of ceremonies.

Miss June Brown of Kearney, and Mr. Louis Hageneck, a Delta U of Lincoln, will play the wedding march. Miss Brown on the violin and Mr. Hageneck on the piano.

After the wedding trip the young couple will reside at Bartham Farm, North Platte, Neb.
