WOMEN BALK ON SECRETARY

Sever Relations with Men's Suffrage Club at Des Moines.

MAN'S SUPPORTER HISSED DOWN

Police Find it Difficult to Ascertain Motive for Murder of Conductor Ford, Though Several Arrests Have Been Made.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Ia., March 7.—(Special Telegram.)—Dissonant relations between the women who favor men's suffrage and the men who want to help women to vote were finally broken off this afternoon at a stormy political meeting at the city library when the executive committee of the Political Equality club passed a resolution not to make any more contributions for suffrage work until the men's club for women suffrage is organized and a better looking secretary is employed to manage the campaign. The trouble has been really over Secretary Greely Gue, who is a son of former Governor Gue, who is not liked by some of the women.

Motive Hard to Find. The detective force is still at sea as to reasons for the murder of Conductor Ford Sunday night. Several persons have been arrested on suspicion, but have not been identified as having connection with the crime. The police have practically settled upon the theory that the persons who shot the conductor were employed by some other person to do it, but for what reason they cannot say.

Guard Ready to Move. Officers of the National Guard have received orders to be in readiness to move with the state militia to the Mexican frontier at a moment's notice. Great secrecy surrounds the plans of the War department and state department, but it was given out that several officers of the Iowa guard have been notified to pick their subordinate officers and be in readiness to move to the border on short notice.

Farmers to Organize. Sessions of the Iowa convention of farmers' clubs closed this afternoon. The officers who were elected last September will hold for another year and the executive committee is to employ a state organizer as soon as funds are received for the same.

Seeks Annulment of Divorce. Alleging her husband left his home with the intention of getting a divorce fraudulently from her that he might marry another woman whom he had promised to wed prior to the time of desertion, Mrs. C. L. Coussens of La Grange, a suburb of Chicago, filed suit in the district court here today to have annulled the decree of divorce obtained here recently by her husband.

THOUSAND DOLLARS REWARD FOR LOCATING A FARMER

SIoux CITY, Ia., March 7.—One thousand dollars reward now is offered for information as to the whereabouts of William Schneiderhauer, the Union county South Dakota farmer, who disappeared mysteriously from his home one week ago. C. M. Beams, the young man's father-in-law, who is wealthy, offers the reward.

No trace of the missing man has been found. He is 24 years old, about five feet, seven inches tall, weighs 130 or 150 pounds; has dark eyes, black curly hair, no beard or mustache when last seen. He was clad in brown shirt, corduroy sheep-lined coat, cap of same color, blue serge coat and vest and blue bib overalls.

BUTTON WORKERS MAY APPEAL TO CONGRESS

MUSCATINE, Ia., March 7.—Acting on a suggestion made by John Mitchell, vice president of the American Federation of Labor, who spoke here today in behalf of the striking button workers of Muscatine, the local unionists will petition congress for a congressional inquiry into the Muscatine situation.

MARSHALLTOWN.—Moses Stern, one of the pioneer merchants of this city and one of the oldest Old Fellows in the state, died at the Iowa Old Fellows home at Mason City Wednesday afternoon of pneumonia.

Four Men Are Killed By Explosion of Gas. VANCOUVER, B. C., March 7.—A gas explosion today in the mine of the Diamond Vale Mining company at Berrett, B. C., ten miles northeast of Vancouver, killed four men and imprisoned several others. Rescue apparatus has been sent.

PRESIDENT AROSEMENA RESUMES HIS OFFICE. PANAMA, March 7.—Pablo Arosemena today resumed the office of president of the Panama republic in response to appeals of friends who considered that he would not be chosen at the approaching presidential election.

The resumption of office by President Arosemena before the expiration of the six months' leave of absence granted him by the supreme court on February 7 expires him from participation as a candidate in the presidential campaign. The constitution of Panama provides that the holder of an office is not liable for the succeeding term, but by taking leave of absence from the executive office for six months Arosemena would have made himself eligible.

Breckenridge Talks to Civic Federation on Legal Reforms

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Members of the National Civic Federation today discussed the tentative draft of a bill supplementing the Sherman anti-trust act which was proposed by the federation's department on the regulation of corporations and presented by President Seth Low.

Another section of the federation's deliberations was devoted to the discussion of the operation and expanding of the government pure food and drugs act under the championship of John Hays Hammond. Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, chief of the government bureau of chemistry, made the principal address and L. P. Brown, president of the National Association of State Food and Dairy Commissioners, and Dr. William J. Schiefel, of the Wholesale Drug Association also spoke.

Reform in legal procedure was the subject of addresses by Everett P. Wheeler, chairman of the American Bar Association, and Ralph W. Breckenridge, chairman of the federation's committee on legal procedure.

Monoplane Makes Trip from London to Paris in Three Hours

PARIS, March 7.—Henri Salvey, the French flying man, arrived at Issy-les-Moulineaux, a suburb of Paris, in his monoplane today, having traveled from London without a stop when he covered 225 miles in two hours and fifty-seven minutes.

He declared that having urgent business to transact in Paris and seeing that the London to Paris train and steamboat service was affected by the coal strike he had decided to make the voyage through the air in spite of the unfavorable weather.

Nebraskans Admitted to U. S. Supreme Court

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, March 7.—(Special Telegram.)—On motion of Senator Brown, Edwin E. Squires of Broken Bow was admitted to practice in the supreme court today. Arthur E. Wells of Omaha was also admitted on motion of Robert B. Scott of Chicago.

M. C. Brome of Omaha moved the admission of James B. Bheon of St. Paul, Minn. Messrs. Wells and Sheehan represent the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy and other roads in suits against Fred Miller and Bud Latta, in which the latter recovered heavy damages for the loss of horses shipped over the roads, and Messrs. Brome and Squires appear for the shippers, both of whom are Nebraskans. The case is on the docket, but could not be reached before adjournment this afternoon. It will probably be the first case to be argued tomorrow.

STORY COUNTY PICKS SOLID DELEGATION FOR CUMMINS. DES MOINES, March 7.—The Story county republican convention at Nevada this afternoon selected a solid Cummins delegation to the state and congressional conventions. A resolution instructing delegates to vote for Cummins was adopted.
