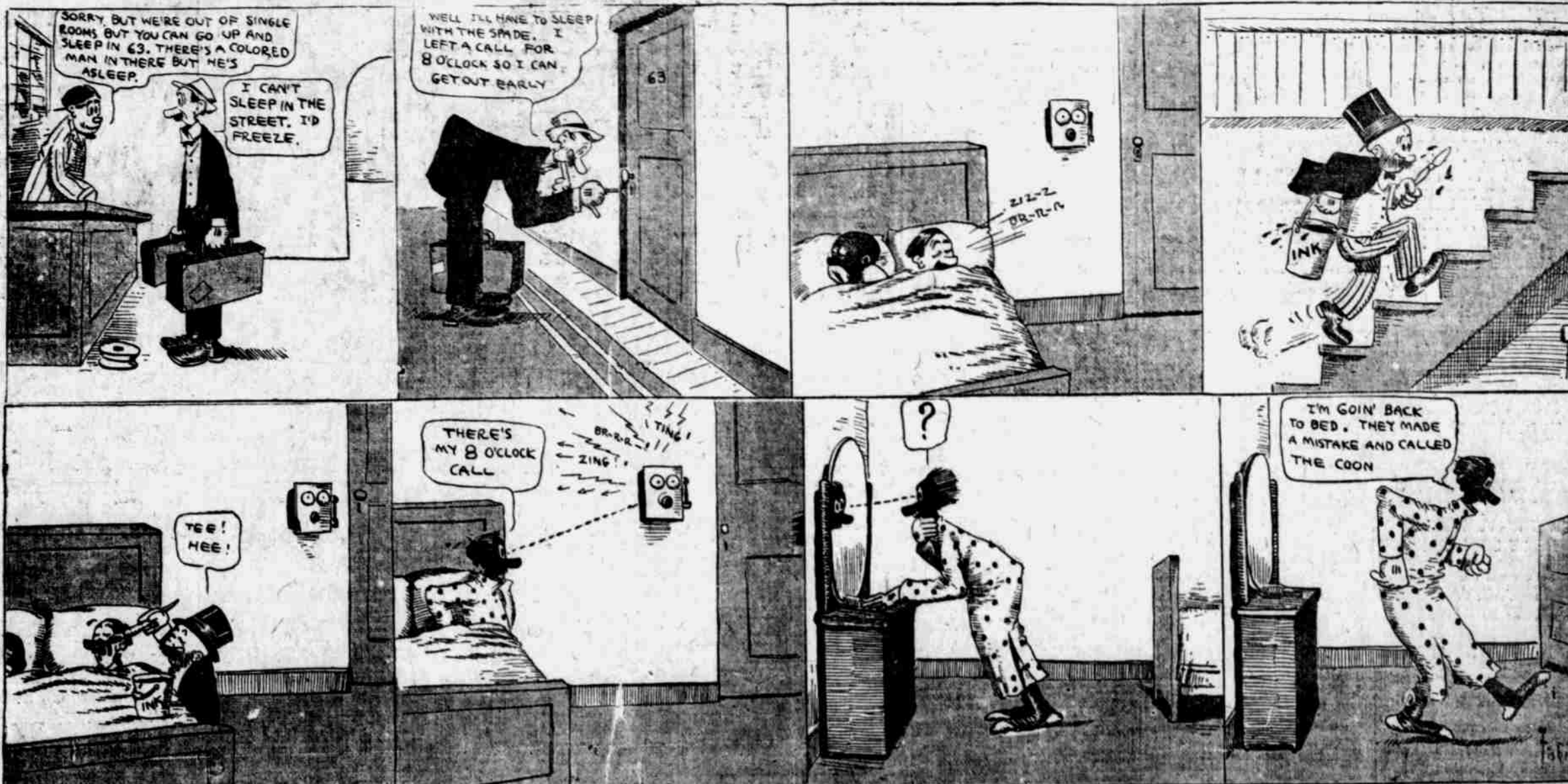

He was identified as the man who called for mail under that name at the postoffice at Chillicothe, Mo., last week.

### TWELFTH WANTS MEMBER

Citizens Insist on Having Councilman From the Ward.

### McGOVERN GETS A REAL SHOCK

Member From the Ninth Asks Question that is Finally Answered with a Slam by a Petitioner.

Members of the city council in committee of the whole Monday afternoon were thrown into a fit of political delirium when fifty citizens of the Twelfth ward appeared to demand the appointment of a representative of their ward to replace Charles M. Davis, who resigned under fire of graft accusations. Councilman Johnson announced their intention of leaving the office vacant, turning the young councilman's salary over to the ward for improvement purposes and themselves passing on Twelfth ward matters.

"You might represent us satisfactorily, but if we can get along without a representative here, the other wards could also," declared A. E. Joseph.

Councilman Bridges sat stunned beyond speech, but his colleagues, overriding the peace-makers' protests, expressed their resentment. It developed in a few minutes of heated controversy that several citizens appeared to fill out the councilman's unexpired term. A petition unanimously signed asking that A. J. Bourke be appointed was presented. The name of Alf E. Lindell was mentioned and somebody nominated M. L. Endres, M. J. Curran was also mentioned for the place.

McGovern Wants to Know.

Councilman McGovern demanded to know the need of a representative for two short months. Thereafter Councilman Sheldon, presiding, devoted his entire attention to keeping the house in order.

While Councilman Finkhouse and McGovern were busily engaged in an attempt to placate the irate voters of the Twelfth, Councilman Hummel was compelled to escort a too ardent supporter to the door, asking him to breathe not again into the sacred chamber his very odorous breath. At the conclusion of this incident the argument was resumed.

"Have you ever been represented here?" McGovern slammed the question at Pierce Metz, who had the floor. Metz evaded the question, and L. O. Warner and Frank Loedel, listening to the cross-fire, said there was an impression general in the Twelfth ward that Mr. Davis was more "sinned against than sinning."

McGovern insisted on an answer and Councilman Johnson rose to a point of order.

"Mr. Chairman, the gentleman is attempting to inject extraneous matter into this discussion."

Chairman Sheldon ruled the point well-taken, but McGovern was in a war-like mood and would not subside. Metz sat down and a meeker man arose and after walloping him with a broadside of questions regarding the civic services of the councilman, McGovern was content.

Twelfth Warders Talk.

A. J. Faddock, Alf E. Lindell, M. L. Endres, B. J. Scamell, C. T. Walker, Dean Griggs, Pierce Metz and A. J. Bourke spoke for the Twelfth ward, demanding that the vacancy be filled. Some favored a democrat; others a republican, but all wanted the position of the former republican councilman filled.

After Councilman McGovern had deplored the fix into which Mr. Davis had got himself, comparing him to the man in an aeroplane who was cheered while he flew, but when he fell people sadly shook their heads and said he had made a mistake, Councilman Berka, Kugel and Schroeder asked that the demand of the Twelfth ward delegation be granted.

There was objection to this, but when representatives of the Belvidere-Newton Improvement club explained that until this improvement club was organized the Twelfth got never a thing it wanted of the council, the objections were overruled, and it was decided to allow candidates to file their names with the city clerk. These names will be presented for action at the council meeting this evening.

### Pressing Electric Light Contract Through Council

The council in committee of the whole Monday afternoon recommended that a contract be entered into with the electric light company extending the company's franchise over two more years.

This recommendation was made upon report of the committee to which the matter had been referred. Electric light company officials had held out for a two-years' extension, but agreed to the three-years' contract.

Commercial club members appeared to protest against the poor light service, and to place themselves on record as opposed to a contract in which the city's interest were not properly safeguarded.

Among those who discussed the light situation were: C. H. Pickens, A. C. Smith, W. M. Glas, Joseph Barker, F. A. Nash, Edgar Allen, W. S. Wright, John Steel and members of the council.

By the contract 150 flaming arc lights will be installed in the business section of the city. Representatives of the Belvidere Improvement club came to various parts of the city instead of down town, but their demands were opposed by a large majority of the citizens present.

### Change to Come in M. P. Directorate

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 12.—A change is to be made in the directorate of the Missouri Pacific at the annual meeting of stockholders here today.

The name of the man who will retire was enveloped in deepest secrecy tonight. George J. Gould was pointed out as the only man who could tell anything about the program to be submitted to the meeting.

This secrecy started all sorts of rumors, resulting stories in circulation, some through George J. Gould was relinquishing control of the so-called Gould line. It was suggested that he might contemplate dropping the chairmanship of the board of directors of the road, as he had the presidency in favor of Benjamin J. Bush.

### ARGUMENT OVER HIS WIFE PROMPTS EFFORT AT SUICIDE

After an argument as to what ailment necessitated his wife's being sent to a hospital for an operation, Charles Fray, 210 North Seventeenth street, attempted suicide at 3:30 o'clock last night by drinking carbolic acid. He was revived by Police Surgeon Hibberd and will recover.

Fray, his bride of two months and his mother-in-law indulged in a quarrel ancient whether Mrs. Fray was suffering from appendicitis when taken to the hospital. When she accused him of having shoved her against a bed and hurting her side, Fray went to the corner drug store and bought the acid. He returned home and took it without saying another word.

Fray is 32 years old. He is employed as a window washer at the Union Pacific headquarters building.
