Albert A. Gibson, 56 years old, pioneer of Omaha and first foreman of the Union Pacific blacksmith shop, died at his home in Benson Friday afternoon.

Mr. Gibson had been retired for about eleven years. He was once president of the Omaha city council and also served as a member of the school board.

Mr. Gibson was born on February 4, 1852, in Fitchburg, Mass., and came to this city in December, 1868. He soon afterward secured employment at the Union Pacific shops, where he remained for many years.

His wife, Jeanette McCrea Gibson, died on September 25, 1908. He is survived by a sister, the widow of George E. Bryan, once a prominent man in Madison, Wis.; a daughter, Mrs. Ida Gibson Knight, and a son, Martin A. Gibson, both of this city.

Deaths was caused by pneumonia, with which he had been sick for a week. The funeral services will be conducted at the home, 246 South Lynn street, Benson, Covert Lodge, No. 11, Masons, will attend the funeral in a body, leaving the Temple at 1 o'clock and conducting the service at 2 o'clock and interment will be made in Mt.
