

HELD FOR WHITE SLAVERY

Bertie Love and Claude Stoley Arrested at Hot Springs, Ark.

WILL BE BROUGHT TO OMAHA

Federal Grand Jury Which Considers Here Next Month Will Consider Case—Girl is Brought from Chicago.

Two Omaha persons have been arrested in Hot Springs, Ark., and are being brought back to Omaha by federal authorities to answer to the charge of white slavery.

Bertie Love and Stoley are alleged to have brought from Chicago to Omaha via Des Moines, Junita Ford, a 15-year-old girl for immoral purposes, and by crossing from one state to another violated the interstate commission laws.

The three persons were first sighted in Chicago by the federal authorities and were trailed by the government authorities on suspicion, it being thought that the girl was to be used in white slavery.

Mr. Lins then went to the United States attorney's office and filed a complaint against Bertie Love and Stoley, but when he attempted to serve the papers on the pair a day later the girl had been spirited away and Love and Stoley had left town.

Lurid Advertising to Be Suppressed

Five sales of merchandise, railroad wheel sales and any startling misrepresentation or fraud in advertisements by merchants will be classed as misdemeanors and violations of an ordinance to be drafted by those interested in suppressing such lurid advertising.

Members of the Commercial club and the license inspecting department believe the present ordinance is not sufficient to cover the case and will probably present another to the council within the next few weeks.

It is really a means of luring customers and often of selling them inferior merchandise at a price for which good or the best could be bought, say those in favor of regulation by ordinance.

The ordinance passed does not regulate and we would like to have some means of controlling or preventing such outrages as this, said Assistant License Inspector Mathiesen, picking up a large and lurid advertisement of a "wreck sale."

RELIGIOUS CAMPAIGN OPENS

First Meeting at the First Presbyterian Church Last Evening.

DR. LANSING SPEAKS TWICE

Talks to the Students at the Presbyterian Theology Seminary and at the University of Omaha.

The opening gun in the Men and Religion Forward Movement was fired yesterday in the appearance of Dr. Isaac J. Lansing of New York City, expert on social service, who immediately launched into his work by addressing the Presbyterian seminary and the Omaha university yesterday morning in mass meetings, promulgating the principles of his department.

It is estimated that over sixty of Omaha's churches and their pastors have united to forward the work which intends to evoke the spiritual duties of the citizens of Omaha, especially the men and boys, and that with succeeding days till Sunday the committee of speakers and coworkers will carry on an active campaign to arouse the men to a more active interest, especially on the social aspect the church stands for today.

The movement intends to awaken a specific interest by the men and boys in the social service of the churches and Dr. Lansing, a leader in this department, is eager to arouse Omaha along with other cities of the state and country to a full realization of the importance of this feature in the development of the moral and religious duties which is ever before a Christian nation.

Detective is Sued for Vicious Attack

Detective Henry Heitfeldt cracked John A. B. Martin in the mouth with a revolver, knocking out two teeth, and inflicted other painful injuries, according to a demand for \$20,000 damages filed by Martin. Heitfeldt is sued on his bond, the bonding company having been made co-defendant.

Resistance may have been given, for Martin declares that the officer struck him on the back of the head, flooring him. Martin picked himself up only to be felled again, this time his eyesight having been shattered. He came up for the third time and was struck violently in the mouth with the detective's revolver.

HAMMERING ON THE SLATES

Lively Reception Accorded Citizens' Union and Labor Tickets.

MEMBERS LEAVING BOTH BODIES

Complaints on Methods and Results, of Platform Announced and on Other Points Are Generally Heeded.

As the slates are coming out in the commissionship contest, the hammers are appearing as a matter of course. And some pretty lively hammer swinging is in progress, as can be determined by listening wherever two or three are gathered together to discuss the local situation.

In the Citizens' union much murmuring is heard, dissatisfaction with the ticket chosen, with the methods pursued, and with the platform announced is expressed, and talk of withdrawal among members is rife. One candidate for the endorsement of the Citizens' union is said by his supporters to have had the votes of 80 members, who mind especially that they might vote for him. He was ignored by the executive committee, and now his friends insist that he will go to the polls and bust the combination wide open.

LABOR LEAGUE ALSO SPLIT

Much the same condition exists in the Labor League. The slate makers there have not met with the enthusiastic support of the members that they expected, and are getting some pretty plain talk from the men who are expected to furnish the vote. Withdrawals of some of the big labor organizations from the league seem certain.

The platform adopted by the Citizens' union candidates is also the topic of considerable heated discussion. It was adopted by the candidates who expect to run on it, but it doesn't meet the approval of all who are expected to assist in selecting them. Especially is it objected to by the editor of the newspaper that was looked upon as being the real undaunted advocate of all the Citizens' union adopted. He has openly expressed his disapproval of the document, perhaps because he did not write it, and now the

candidate are receiving demands that the platform be recalled.

Only Unselfish Organization. The publicity committee of the Citizens' union puts out its daily "dope sheet," setting forth that the Citizens' union is a "self-constituted" body, but is only one of a number of such; the difference being, according to the bulletin, that the Citizens' union is the only one that is not organized for a selfish purpose, the only one without an axe to grind or a special interest to serve.
